Subj: Commission Update

- 1. <u>2018 SLA Funding:</u> Attached is a copy of the SLA Funding Agreement for 2019. I am requesting approval to have the Chairman sign the 2019 SLA Agreement.
- 2. <u>Credentialing System:</u> Each responder and all equipment is required to be entered into the Comprehensive Resource Management & Credentialing System (CRMCS) and identification badges be printed to allow for immediate check in at any incident. I am requesting approval to hire a temporary employee to assist with the input of this data into the CRMCS system. This position will be short term (two months or less) and will require computer skills and will attend fire meetings in the evenings.
- 3. <u>Hazard Mitigation Grant Program-Post Fire (HMGP-PF)</u>: Attached is an email I received regarding this new grant. I will be working with a contractor to apply for project funds identified by the grant guidelines.
- 4. Annual Exercise: The annual full scale exercise was completed on Wednesday, August 22, 2018. The exercise was conducted at the SD State Veterans Home, and involved all responders, Fall River Health and Pine Hills. The After Action Review (AAR) will be conducted in September and all paperwork will be submitted to the State and involved agencies.

Dear Frank Maynard:

As you know, the Emergency Management State and Local Agreement (SLA) provides a single funding, operating, and reporting instrument for the accomplishment of agreed upon activities and products. The Agreement, in particular, acknowledges the SLA applies to preparedness for natural and man-made disasters.

The 2019 State & Local Agreement Sub-Recipient Agreement is comprised of the main agreement and three exhibits; Exhibit A which describes the grant, Exhibit B which describes terms and conditions that apply to the grant, and Exhibit C which identifies the work requirements under the SLA. Exhibit B is derived from Federal requirements of the Emergency Management Performance Grant (the grant the SLA funds are awarded from). Entities receiving funds from this grant must abide by all Terms and Conditions outlined in this Exhibit. Exhibit C identifies the work items that all reimbursed positions must participate in and the period in which they must be completed.

An important clarification for this year is that the County Emergency Manager must maintain a work schedule commensurate with the percentage of time funded by this grant for Emergency Management functions. Percentage of time worked on Emergency Management functions must be documented in timekeeping records utilizing the State timesheet. If the County Emergency Manager is considered 100% time, they can hold no other role or position within county government. If the County wishes or requires for the County Emergency Manager to conduct other activities for the County, such as 911 Coordinator, Veteran's Service Officer, Deputy Sheriff, or any other role, position, or duty, they cannot be considered 100%-time County Emergency Manager. As a reminder, since October 1, 2016 the Citizen Corps programs are not eligible activities for personnel or equipment (these include Fire Corps, Neighborhood Watch, Medical Reserve Corps, and Volunteer in Police Services-VIPS) except for Community Emergency Response Team (CERT).

Please have your Commission sign the 2019 State & Local Agreement Sub-Recipient Agreement and return the signed signature page to your Regional Coordinator by September 30, 2018. We will notify you when we receive our EMPG award in the spring/summer of 2019 and are able to provide reimbursement payments.

Note to the County Auditor:

The SLA grant is provided to counties to pay for 50% of the emergency management director's salary and benefits accrued as a result of maintaining the office of the director. This is an ongoing grant with a Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance number of 97.042. This grant and any other associated with the South Dakota Office of Emergency Management is to be accounted for within fund 226.

Good morning,

available in the declared county or counties, including Indian tribal governments, with lands affected by the declared wildfires. The project may be outside of this Management Assistance Grant (FMAG) will receive \$425,008 in HMGP funds to complete mitigation projects. The priority of mitigation assistance will be made then it may be available statewide regardless of whether it benefits a declared area or wildfire mitigation and any type of mitigation project is eligible to apply area, as long as the risk reduction benefits the declared county or affected tribe's land (e.g., watershed mitigation). If funding cannot be used in these areas, Beginning June 5, 2018, FEMA implemented a new Hazard Mitigation Grant Program-Post Fire (HMGP-PF). With these funds, each State receiving a Fire for these funds.

On a side note, quite a few of the Rural Electric Cooperatives have projects in our queue waiting for funding. We do realize that time to time that some of you cannot wait for funding and complete the project. This is great and we ask that you check in with Martin Christopherson from time to time on your projects in our queue about their completeness and your priority you would wish to have these projects funded. I have included Martin on this email for your reference.

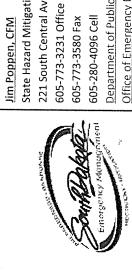
The State of South Dakota has received two FMAG declarations and has \$850,016 in mitigation dollars available. The first FMAG was in Custer County for the Legion Lake fire in December 2017 and the second FMAG was for the Vineyard Fire in Fall River County in August 2018. The HMGP-PF funds are divided into \$748,015 for regular projects, \$59,501 for 7% planning projects and \$42,500 for 5% initiative projects. Applications will be due to Office of Emergency Management at close of business on December 15, 2018.

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### Problem:

The State of South Dakota has a 20 minute blocked crossing law for all public crossing.

In many cases there may be a reason for blocking a crossing in excessive of 20 minutes.

The public has an interest in the ability to have free movement over public railroad crossings not only for their daily business in their personal lives but also for personal emergencies. In addition the public railroad crossing need to remain reasonably open for emergency vehicles and school buses.

It is known that railroad yards have extended limits where trains can be left while crews pick up and set out cars. Cars can be pre-readied, pre-air tested and moved off public crossings for any further air testing when put into a train. Such would minimize the time blocking public crossings.

At the HI Way crossing at East Edgemont, SD there have been many cases of the public railroad crossing being blocked for up to two hours and many cases of it being blocked for one hour

In most cases no emergency was involved but employees doing air tests and walking cars. We do not want to delay operations by attempting to arrest crew members who very likely are doing their jobs as currently being allow to by the operating officers of the railroad.

It is our desire to make a "Good Faith Effort to identify the problem and seek a solution one way or the other with the BNSF". To do so both parties need to gather information and focus on the issue.

With this information being gathered and complied the issue can then be addressed further with the appropriate State agencies, Federal Railroad Administration and higher operational levels of BNSF.

A copy of all reports requested and gathered will remain on file with the SD Fall River County Sheriff's Dept.

### Ordinance:

Therefor to understand why the public railroad crossing was blocked in excess of 20 minutes the following will apply.

When the public railroad crossing is blocked in excess of 20 minutes the highest ranking operating officer having operational jurisdiction over crews blocking the crossing will within three days file a full report explaining why it was blocked with the Fall River Country Sheriff's office. All employees are under the operational supervision of the operating officers who by position need to become more directly involved in solving his recurring problem.

In addition to the reason the report will contain the following.

Date - times involved.

Train ID - Lead Engine ID - Loads - empties and tonnage.

Number of cars being picked up and or set out.

Names of all crew members. This will include a signed statement by each member of the crew as to why the crossing was blocked in excess of 20 minutes.

Time the crossing was blocked and time the crossing was cleared.

Was there railroad transportation available for the crew to use to decrease time blocking the crossing: such as opening the crossing for movement in emergency and or to let public traffic move through?

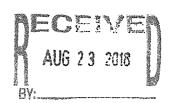
Was traffic at the crossing informed of the use of the emergency route through the back side of the yard that was agreed to as use in emergencies? Are there gates or signs indicating that the public can use such in emergency including directions?

What was the emergency? If there was no emergency was there any disciplinary action taken in regards to the employees involved?

This information when requested by the Sheriff's office will be complied by the above carrier officer and furnished to the Sheriff's Office within three days from the date requested by the Fall River Country Sheriff's Office.

Failure to furnish	the above information will result in an arrest warrant and personal fine
in the amount of	levied on the BNSF carrier officer who has
operational jurisd	iction.
