### FALL RIVER COUNTY UNAPPROVED MINUTES OF JANUARY 7, 2021

The Fall River Board of County Commissioners met in regular session on January 7, 2021. Present: Joe Allen, Les Cope, Joe Falkenburg, Heath Greenough, Deb Russell and Sue Ganje, Auditor. The Oath of Office for Joe Allen, Les Cope and Heath Greenough were placed on file with the Auditor.

The Pledge of Allegiance was given, and the meeting called to order at 9:00 a.m.

The agenda was reviewed for conflicts; none were noted. ALL MOTIONS RECORDED IN THESE MINUTES WERE PASSED BY UNANIMOUS VOTE, UNLESS OTHERWISE STATED. The meeting was turned over to the Auditor, who asked for nominations for the Chairman of the Board. Nomination was made by Russell, seconded by Allen, for Falkenburg as Chairman.

The Auditor asked for further nominations. Motion made by Russell, seconded by Cope, to have nominations cease. Falkenburg is the Chair for 2021. The meeting was turned back to the Chairman of the Board.

Motion made by Falkenburg, seconded by Allen, to nominate Russell as the Vice-Chair.

Motion made by Greenough, seconded by Cope to have nomination cease. Russell is the Vice-Chair for 2021.

The board reviewed the list of items to approve, Susan Henderson asked to remove the First National Bank of Lead as a depository; Russell noted that our policy gives the treasurer the authority to choose between approved banks for investment of county monies.

Motion made by Allen, seconded by Greenough, to set the ride-a-long fee for prisoner and mental health transports – \$40.00 per day to Rapid City and \$100.00 per day to Yankton and Sioux Falls.

Motion made by Cope, seconded by Russell, to approve setting the meeting dates on the  $1^{st}$  and  $3^{rd}$  Thursday of each month.

Motion made by Russell, seconded by Cope, to approve the consent agenda through the indigent burial rate (with the exception of the banks, ride-a-long fees and appointments) as follows: to appoint the Fall River County Herald-Star as the Official newspaper for 2021; to designate three feet of the bulletin board in the courthouse lobby for legal matters and to also post Commission agendas on the ground, side and first floor doors of the courthouse; to designate chattel mortgage sale places as the Courthouse front door, Oral Post Office, Oelrichs Post Office, and the Edgemont Post Office; to set the prisoner care per day at \$85.00 as per Sheriff's Office; to approve the Fall River Rural Health Clinic as the health care facility for jail, under the direct supervision of Dr. Avery Sides, as primary caregiver for inmates and the Regional Health Medical Clinic as the secondary, to approve Tina Norton, Inmate Contract Nurse, \$1,250.00 per month, and to set the Indigent burial rate at \$1,900.00.

Motion made by Russell, seconded by Cope, to appoint Joe Allen and alternate Joe Falkenburg

to the L.E.P.C. board; appoint Joe Falkenburg and alternate Heath Greenough to the Weed board; to appoint Les Cope and alternate Deb Russell to the Custer/Fall River Regional Waste Management Board; and appoint Deb Russell and alternate Les Cope to the Black Hills Council of Local Governments Board (6<sup>th</sup> District of Local Governments); to appoint Heath Greenough and alternate Joe Falkenburg to the Resource, Conservation and Development (R C & D) board; to appoint Joe Allen and alternate Les Cope to the Western SD Juvenile Services Center Board, and appoint Deb Russell and alternate Joe Falkenburg to the Prairie Hills Transit Board.

Motion made by Russell, seconded by Greenough, to approve travel for the county officials to attend meetings of the Black Hills Associations and to request office supervisors to obtain travel approval for all other meetings requiring more than same-day travel.

Motion made by Greenough, seconded by Allen, to approve the following resolutions on State Bids and Election fees and mileage; and the following listing: Longevity schedule; 2021 Commission salaries; 2021 salaries for appointed officials, and the 2021 listing of employee wages, including per diem for the weed board at \$25.00 per meeting plus mileage and coroner per call amount, and to table the 2021 elected official salaries resolution for the treasurer, auditor, register of deeds, state's attorney and sheriff until after executive session:

Motion made by Greenough, seconded by Cope, to set the chairman of the mental health board's fee of \$125.00 per hour; to not rehire any employee who is eligible for and has retirement funds withheld, for a period of 6 months, if that employee has resigned and withdrawn their SD Retirement Funds, unless specifically authorized by the Board; to have government agencies notify the county on activities and to appoint Stacey Martin, PIO (Public Information Officer), with Melissa Fleming and Bobbie Janis as assistants.

Motion made by Russell, seconded by Allen, to approve the December 1 and December 10, 2020 minutes. The December 15, 2020 minutes were not available.

Motion made by Greenough, seconded by Russell, to confirm that an easement is not needed in relation to the vacation of part of a Highway, formerly known as County Road 9 and River Road, petitioned by Mark Tubbs, Tubbs Land and Cattle.

No applicants for county assistance met with the board.

Eric Pickar, Attorney for Bangs McCullen Law firm, met with the board, via google meets. Motion made by Russell, seconded by Allen, to accept the petition for Spirit Canyon Road District and set the election date for February 2, 2021.

Motion made by Russell, seconded by Cope, to deny the request to waive payments pursuant to SDCL 6-16-12.

Bob Evans, Sheriff, met with the board to report that there are 21 males and 4 females in the Fall River County Jail, 3 females and 1 male in the Pennington County Jail, with 1 inmate on work release, for a total of 30 inmates.

Discussion was held on need for one more Deputy. Motion made by Greenough, seconded by Russell, to approve hiring one additional Deputy Sheriff.

Motion made by Russell, seconded by Greenough, to approve the 2021 contract for housing of prisoners and detainees in the Pennington County Jail and authorize the Sheriff to sign.

Teresa Pullen, Treasurer, met with the board. Motion made by Allen, seconded by Greenough, to allow Pullen to continue with First Interstate Bank as a new credit card issuer for the county.

Falkenburg questioned Pullen on interest amounts paid by First National Bank of Lead, which is 2.00% for cd's and .40% for the ICS account. Pullens noted attempts made for local investments. Motion made by Greenough, seconded by Russell, to designate, by roll call vote, First Interstate Bank, First National Bank of Lead, Bank of the West, Black Hills Federal Credit Union, Black Hills Community Bank, Liberty National Bank as the official banks for 2021.

Randy Seiler, Highway Superintendent, met with the board. Motion made by Greenough, seconded by Cope, to set the private road work hearing for February 4, 2021, 9:55 a.m. as per SDCL 31-11-41 thru 31-11-45.

Seiler updated the board that they have been graveling or blading when there is moisture. Butler will be down to discuss the road grader at a future meeting; the current buy back on the 2014 motor grader the board will sell is \$150,000.00 from Butler Machinery. The Chilson Bridge and the Township Bridge north of Dewey are on schedule and will happen about the same time. So far there is no state action on the Provo Bridge.

SD Representatives Trish Ladner & Tim Goodwin (in person) and Senator Julie Frye-Mueller (via google meet) met with the board to discuss issue of possible increased property taxes due to current sales in the county. Also present were Don Olstad and Susie Hayes, Director of Equalization. The Senator and Representatives are willing to explore options which may include changes to school formulas, elderly freeze, and assessing agriculture land valuations, and to introduce bills while they are in session. The problem does exist statewide, but mostly West River. The continuing increase of values will affect residents and ability to stay in their homes.

The board was updated on Covid monies, Shep's Canyon Road, improving cell phone and internet service and Amendment A and Initiated Measure 26. The owner-occupied levy is applied differently by counties, which will be looked at as use of soils for ag land.

Discussion was also held on state's rights and Article 10; there needs to be more separation between the states and the federal government.

### MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

#### Between

### SDSU Extension and Counties of South Dakota 2021

In accordance with Chapter 4.05, Section 4.0504, Revised Code of 1939 and as subsequently amended to conduct Extension educational programs in Agriculture and Natural Resources, Family and Consumer Sciences, Community Development and 4H/Youth Development with the complete understanding of all parties concerned. SDSU Extension, the United Stated Department of Agriculture and the Board of County Commissioners of Fall River County enter in the following agreement:

#### COOPERATIVE EDUCATIONAL PROGRAM DEVELOPMENT

SDSU Extension agrees to give guidance and active assistance to the 4-H Advisor in determining and carrying out 4-H and Youth Development educational programs that will be of greatest benefit to the people in the county. SDSU Extension agrees to assist the 4-H Advisor in the conduct of their work by providing program planning and development, leadership, training, supervision, and subject matter support through Extension specialists, field specialists, publications, and technology information services.

### PERSONNEL AND FINANCIAL RESPONSIBILITY OF COOPERATING COUNTY

The Board of County Commissioners agrees to furnish an office suitable to all parties of the Memorandum. The Board of County Commissioners further agrees to provide sufficient funds for qualified office administrative support, 4-H Advisor travel expenses, office supplies, and equipment, postage, demonstration and educational supplies, telephone/internet and related charges and computer/related equipment, subject to the county's budgetary authority.

The Board of County Commissioners agrees to pay annually to South Dakota State University for partial salary support of the 4-H Advisor position. Payments must be made by the 31<sup>st</sup> day of March in this calendar year. For the calendar year 2021, this is in the amount of \$10,310. This position will work 50% of time in Fall River County. Should the position become vacant during the 2021 calendar year, or portions thereof, the county shall be reimbursed on a pro-rata basis for such period(s) of vacancy at the close of the calendar year.

The Board of County Commissioners agrees to reimburse the 4-H Advisor for official use of their personal vehicle, meals and lodging on official business away from their county office headquarters at rates and policies equal to or above those established by the State Board of Finance. The 4-H Advisor will submit itemized vouchers for official travel expenses to the County Auditor for presentation to the Board of County Commissioners for payment.

The 4-H Advisor will travel within the county to serve clientele and conduct educational programming. Furthermore, the 4-H Advisor will participate in some out-of-county activities that are related to their duties for the county, e.g. State Fair, for which the Board of County Commissioners agrees to reimburse travel expenses. The Board of County Commissioners further agrees to allow the 4-H Advisor to participate in some training and special events outside of the county which are related to their duties and continued professional development. For these specific mandated professional development events, SDSU Extension will provide travel reimbursement to the 4-H Advisor.

### ACCESS TO CONFIDENTIAL DATA

Access to SDSU Extension data and communications, whether it resides on county-owned or SDSU Extension-owned equipment, shall be restricted to South Dakota State University personnel or their respective designees. As stated in the South Dakota Board of Regents Acceptable Use Policy, information resources and technology should be used to support the operations and missions of the South Dakota Regental System. Accordingly, the Chief Information Technology Office at South Dakota State University will investigate any and all allegations of misuse of technology by SDSU Extension personnel. Allegations of misuse of technology on county-owned equipment by SDSU Extension personnel will be investigated jointly by the SDSU Office of Information Technology, the Vice President of Information

Technology and the appropriate county personnel. SDSU will work with individual counties as requested to establish a standard Third Party Agreement to address network access concerns.

### COOPERATIVE PERSONNEL EMPLOYMENT POLICY

It shall be the responsibility of SDSU Extension to screen and certify the qualifications of applicants for a vacant position. The County Commission will be represented in interviewing candidate(s) for the open position and participate in recommending approval or rejection of the candidate's employment by SDSU Extension. Salary will be determined by SDSU Extension with approval of South Dakota State University and the South Dakota Board of Regents.

If the performance of a 4-H Advisor becomes unsatisfactory, his/her employment may be terminated in accordance with South Dakota State University and Board of Regents Personnel policies. In addition, SDSU Extension may need to remove a 4-H Advisor when either appropriated State or Federal funds or the County funds are not adequate to satisfactorily carry on effective 4-H and Youth Development Extension educational programs in the county.

The employment policies of SDSU Extension and parties to this cooperative agreement are required to conform to provisions of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and related amendments thereto prohibiting discrimination.

### APPROVAL AND/OR MODIFICATION OF MEMORANDUM

This memorandum will be in effect when the Board of County Commissioners and SDSU Extension approve it. It supersedes all previously signed agreements and shall remain in effect until it is expressly terminated in writing by one or more of the parties concerned. This agreement should be reviewed at the first meeting of the County Commission each year for purposes of informing new members and reacquainting experienced members with its provisions.





I think we have some of the first onslaught on our Second Amendment rights. It is imperative we strike back, at all levels, to ensure our Constitution is upheld and we would like to voice our objection to a recent bill proposed by Ms. Jackson Lee, H.R. 127. We strongly urge you to review this proposed bill to familiarize yourselves with the severity of this attack on our gun rights.

This 19-page bill is completely absurd and is a veiled effort to confiscate our guns. It makes impossible requirements for gun owners. Some of the most striking features are: needing to register every firearm and their ammunition in your possession regardless of how or when it was acquired as well as the storage location of said firearm and ammunition; taking a 24 hour long gun safety training course; the creation of a database of fire arms which would be available to the general public as well as any Law Enforcement Agency; the requirement of a liability insurance policy; being required to notify the Attorney General if a gun or ammunition is loaned to a friend or family member; the requirement of a psychological evaluation by a Licensed Psychologist approved by the Attorney General which would include interviewing the individual, the spouse, family member or close associate of an individual; the inability to transfer or gift a firearm to anyone who has not received a license under the provisions of HR 127; a fee of \$800 for a gun license; fines of \$75,00 to \$150,000 and up to 25 years in prison for violating provisions of HR 127.

With just this brief synopsis, it quickly shows the underlying intent of this anti-gun legislation. We, and our elected officials must remain vigilant to maintain our freedom under the Second Amendment.

We, the Commissioners of Fall River County, South Dakota, strongly urge you to stop the progress of these and other absurd restrictions on our way of life. Please keep us, and your other Constituents of any proposed legislation that would infringe on our Second Amendment freedoms.



The above Typical Road Section and Typical Approach Detail (below) shall be followed in the construction of roads to be placed on the County Road System. Road design shall be consistent with published Standards of the American Association of State Highway Transportation Officials. Road construction materials and methods shall conform to the current published edition the "Standard Specifications for Roads and Bridges" of the South Dakota Department of Transportation, when referenced in the Standards below. Copy of these Specifications is on file at the County Highway Department Office.

The following are standards which shall be met:

- 1. Maximum Grade of any road or portion of road shall not exceed ten percent (10%)
- 2. Maximum Degree of Curvature shall not exceed twenty one degrees (21 degrees)
- 3. Crown rates shall be between 0.02 11/11 to 0.06 11/11. Maximum Super elevation rate in curves shall be 0.07 11/11.
- 4. Culverts shall be sized to assure proper drainage. The minimum size of culvert shall be eighteen inches (18") in diameter. Although fifteen inch (15") diameter will be allowed under certain conditions.
- 5. Gravel Surfacing shall meet the requirements of Part B of the Standard Specifications.
- 6. Asphalt and Concrete construction methods and materials shall meet the requirements of Part C and Part D of the "Standard Specifications".
- 7. All Dead-End Roads shall have Cul-De-Sacs with a minimum constructed radius of fifty feet (50').
- 8. Approaches shall be constructed perpendicular as practical to the County Road.
- 9. The Minimum dedicated Right-Of-Way width shall be sixty six feet (66').

## FALL RIVER COUNTY RESOLUTION NO. 2020-9

AN EMERGENCY RESOLUTION TO ADDRESS A PUBLIC HEALTH CRISIS BY IMPLEMENTING CERTAIN MEASURES WHICH HAVE BEEN DEEMED NECESSARY TO SLOW THE COMMUNITY SPREAD OF CORONAVIRUS (COVID-19).

WHEREAS, the Fall River County Commission has the authority to pass Resolutions, per SDCL§7-8-20 (10), for the purpose of promoting the health, safety, morals and general welfare, of the community and the promotion of health and the suppression of disease; and

WHEREAS, an outbreak of the disease COVID-19, which is caused by the novel coronavirus, has been confirmed in more than 100 countries, including the United States; and

WHEREAS, COVID-19 is a severe respiratory disease transmitted by person-to-person contact, or by contact with surfaces contaminated by the virus. In some cases, especially among older adults and persons with serious underlying health conditions, COVID-19 can result in serious illness requiring hospitalization, admission to an intensive care unit, and death; and

WHEREAS, the World Health Organization (WHO), the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), and the Secretary of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services have declared the outbreak of COVID-19 as a public health emergency; and

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, the President of the United States declared a national emergency in response to the global pandemic of COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, on the same day, Governor Kristi Noem, issued Executive Order 2020-04 which declared a state of emergency to exist in the State of South Dakota in response to the spread of COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, a case of COVID-19 has been confirmed in Western South Dakota; and

WHEREAS, the CDC and health experts have recommended social distancing to slow the spread of COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, social distancing is a method of slowing down or stopping the spread of a contagious disease by reducing the probability of contact between infected persons and those not infected in order to minimize disease transmission; and

WHEREAS, in response to the need to implement social distancing all schools in the state have been closed for at least two weeks; and

WHEREAS, on March 16<sup>th</sup>, 2020, the White House issued guidance recommending that social gatherings of more than ten people be avoided and

WHEREAS, the failure to successfully implement social distancing will likely result in higher numbers of infected individuals and has the potential to overwhelm the capacity of the

## County's health care providers; and

WHEREAS, it is important that control measures be taken to reduce or slow down the spread of COVID-19 in order to protect the health and safety of the County's residents, especially for seniors and those with underlying health conditions that make them particularly vulnerable to COVID-19.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Fall River County Commission that:

- 1. Effective immediately, all Fall River County Facilities are closed to the general public. County and Unified Judicial System offices will continue to operate and conduct business by mail, email, online, by phone or by arranging to work face-to-face/in person on a case-by-case basis.
- 2. Effective immediately, in cases when a member(s) of the public displays symptoms of COVID-19, as specified by the South Dakota Department of Health, the County offices are directed to refuse face-to-face/in person service and encourage the individual(s) to seek medical attention as specified by public health authorities.
- 3. This Resolution shall be reviewed at each upcoming commission meeting, and appropriate action will be taken as needed.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this Resolution is necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, safety, and welfare of Fall River County and shall become effective Monday, March 30<sup>th</sup>, 2020, and is designed to cause the least amount of disruption to the public.

# NOTICE OF GENERAL AIR QUALITY OPERATING PERMIT FOR CONCRETE PLANTS OPERATING IN SOUTH DAKOTA

The South Dakota Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) is proposing to renew four general air quality permits for concrete plants operating throughout the State of South Dakota. The permits will cover both stationary and portable concrete plants with potential emissions less than 100 tons per year. These permits will replace the previous general permits for concrete plants DENR issued on February 17, 2016.

The proposed general permits identify who may seek coverage under the permit, the general permit requirements, air pollution limits, compliance responsibilities, record keeping and reporting requirements, as well as performance test procedures. Issuing these general permits for concrete plants is another attempt by DENR to streamline environmental permitting in South Dakota and to provide better service to all our customers. These general permits will be effective for five years.

Prior to obtaining coverage under the general air quality permit, the applicant must submit a Notice of Intent form to the department. The Notice of Intent form requires the applicant to describe the operations, equipment, and location that will be covered under this permit. The department will review the information contained in the Notice of Intent to determine if the applicant qualifies for coverage under the general permit and is capable of complying with the general permit. If the applicant qualifies and can meet the requirements, coverage under the general air quality permit will be authorized to the applicant.

In accordance with the Administrative Rules of South Dakota (ARSD) 74:36:04:12, any person desiring to comment on DENR's draft permit must submit written comments to the address below within thirty days of this public notice. Comments may be directed to the following mailing address: Teresa Williams; PMB 2020; Department of Environment and Natural Resources; 523 East Capitol; Pierre, South Dakota 57501. DENR will consider and address all comments submitted and issue a final permit decision pursuant to ARSD 74:36:04:12.01. DENR will notify the applicant and each person that submitted written comments or requested notice of DENR's final permit decision, including notification of any changes to the permit based on the comments.

Any person desiring to contest the issuance of this permit and have a contested case hearing must file a petition, which complies with ARSD 74:09:01:01. This petition must be filed either within thirty days of this public notice or, if that person submits comments on DENR's draft permit pursuant to the paragraph above, within thirty days of receiving notice of DENR's final permit decision. Upon receipt of a petition, DENR will schedule this matter for a contested case hearing before the Board of Minerals and Environment.

If no comments or objections are received within thirty days of this public notice, the draft permit becomes the final permit decision and the proposed permit will be issued.



BHRMUC Meeting November 20<sup>th</sup>, 2020 Minutes

Attendees: Eric Jennings, Druse Kellogg, Don Hausle, Randy Deibert, Patty Brown, David Moline, Hugh Thompson, Bill Coburn, Butch Oien, Ben Wudtke

Don Hausle called the meeting to order at 4:08 pm, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

Minutes from the October meeting were approved as presented.

Eric Jennings provided a Treasurers report, detailing income, expenses, and balance. The Treasurers report was approved as presented.

Hausle suggested adding a discussion of the Lawrence County Comprehensive Plan to the agenda with no opposition. Randy Deibert discussed what the Plan is and said a final draft will come before the Commissioners Tuesday the 24<sup>th</sup>, 1pm at The Lodge. Randy invited BHRMUC members to attend the Plan meeting.

Hausle kicked off the OHV discussion by detailing recent incidents involving OHVs, including one of his cattle being hit and killed and a neighbor witnessing events of OHVs harassing cattle. Don followed those comments by recognizing not all OHV users are out to cause problems, but noted the Black Hills NF sold 30,000 OHV trail permits in 2020 and even though the bad actors are a fraction of the users, the number of bad actors begins to add up when that many permits are sold. Don said that although he is not, personally, in favor of reducing the number of OHVs in the Black Hills right now, he indicated a continued lack of enforcement may change that. Other discussion recommended looking at the messaging from rental businesses along with hats and tshirts that sell the message of mud = fun. Hugh Thompson suggested that increasing fines would increase the impact to portion of OHV users who are causing problems and noted that he didn't think 30,000 permits/users would be an issue if folks followed the rules and regulations. Patty Brown suggested looking at what we can do "together", looking for common ground. Patty also noted damage is sometimes caused by full-size vehicles in the forest and reinforced the notion brought up by others that the rules must be enforced. Eric Jennings was in agreement that enforcing the rules and regulations is something we can all rally around and would improve the situation. Eric did, however, caution that there is a sustainable limit to OHV use and law enforcement activity weighs heavy on what that limit may be. Other discussion included the need for additional funding to address the issue, outreach, partnerships, etc. A summary of discussion points from the OHV discussion include:

- Should allow for enjoyment by the public without resource damage or overriding other uses such as non-motorized or other forms of recreation, grazing, timber production, and other uses of the National Forest.
- Enforcement of rules and regulations is paramount law enforcement must be issuing citations and "making it hurt".
- There is a sustainable limit of OHV use, and that limit depends highly on the extent of damage caused by the bad actors.
- Additional signage encouraging responsible use, from BHRMUC and/or partnerships, may help.
- A need to focus on rental businesses and their message to customers.
- An improved trail system, with fewer dead ends, would help (substantially in many places) reduce the incidence of OHV use off trail, through private property/fences, etc.
- Additional funding for a plan external or parallel to FS.

Deibert motioned to collect the comments and distribute them for further comment at the next meeting. Thompson seconded – all were in favor.

Officer Elections – Wudtke said, after discussions with the current officers and without other nominations, that he recommends retaining all four officers. Deibert motioned to retain all current officers, Oien seconded – all in favor.

Round Robin – Hugh Thompson provided commentary on the Range coffee table and boots gifted to the SD Stockgrowers, noting the items were made in China. Patty Brown discussed an issue involving traffic on the Mystic Rd and a request from landowners for the county to mag chloride the road as a dust abatement measure.
