Frank Maynard, Emergency Management, met with the board. Motion made Greenough, seconded by Cope, to table the request for a part-time employee until after executive session.

Maynard reported that he will bring a resolution on who is authorized to order state resources to the next meeting; discussion was also held on the radio tower, fires and incidents.

Dave Weishaupl, Building Supervisor, and Lyle Jensen met with the board. Motion made by Greenough, seconded by Russell, to approve the quote from Rushmore Communications to

upgrade the Ball ranch repeater and HS Fire dispatch radio from a phone line to digital, in the amount of \$14,116.95. This is a reimbursable cost.

The 2020-09 (Covid19) resolution was reviewed. Motion made by Greenough, seconded by Cope, to discontinue greeters at the door, leave plexiglass up and include visible signs to social distance, effective February 28, 2021.

Commissioner Falkenburg spoke of Bill Gates' recommendation for wealthy countries to eat 100% synthetic beef to address climate change and asked that State's Attorney Russell get involved as the board needs to address this.

Bob Evans, Sheriff, met with the board. Motion made by Russell, seconded by Cope, to approve hiring Malachiah Fleming, Jailer, at \$16.50 per hour, effective February 22, 2021, as per union contract. With Greenough abstaining, all others voting yes, motion carries.

Evans reported that he'd like to get the 2013 Dodge Ram pickup fixed after getting a \$2,000 - \$3,000 estimate. Discussion was also held on the extra vehicles and asked for a list. There are 11 males and 2 females in the Fall River County Jail, with 3 males in the Pennington County Jail, with 1 inmate on work release.

Greg Erlandson, Attorney, Bangs McCullen Law Firm, met with the board via telephone to request an amendment to the Order for Organization and Incorporation of the Spirit Canyon Road district due to a change to Lot 3. Motion made by Russell, seconded by Allen, to amend Resolution #2021-6, which will supersede the original resolution, as follows:

FALL RIVER COUNTY RESOLUTION #2021-6 (AMENDED)

ORDER FOR ORGANIZATION AND INCORPORATION OF THE SPIRIT CANYON ROAD DISTRICT FALL RIVER COUNTY, SOUTH DAKOTA

WHEREAS, all voting property owners that are within the proposed district have agreed to and petitioned for the organization of the Spirit Canyon Road District, and

WHEREAS, an Election was held on February 2, 2021 asking the voters to accept or reject the formation of the Spirit Canyon Road District, with _9_ voters accepting and _0_ voters rejecting the formation of the Spirit Canyon Road District, and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED, that the Fall River County Commissioners shall declare the Spirit Canyon Road District to be organized and established as a governmental subdivision of the State of South Dakota and a public body, corporate and political, effective as of today's date, with taxing authority for the 2021 tax year payable in 2022 and after, and

Jim Angell raised concerns about the board initiating this; it may be better if organizations like the Beef Producers or the Cattleman Association put it forth.

Roger Horton, City of Edgemont, met with the board. Motion made by Russell, seconded by Allen, to approve accepting a deed for the South 79.3' of Outlot "E" located in the SE1/4 of the NW1/4 of Section 1, Township 9S, R2E of the Black Hills Meridian, Fall River, SD from the City of Edgemont.

Randy Seiler, Highway Superintendent, met with the board. Motion made by Greenough, seconded by Cope, to approve the January 2021 reimbursement to the highway department for fuel used or work performed as follows: Sheriff's Department for \$1,718.43; Weed and Pest Office for \$132.44; Building for \$24.92; Emergency Management for \$65.54; and Director of Equalization for \$38.06.

Seiler noted that he is getting additional quotes for the possible purchase of a new semi-truck.

Motion made by Allen, seconded by Russell, to approve appointing 3 real property owners for appraisal of the 2014 motor grader, at Seiler's discretion.

Seiler updated the board that paperwork will be signed at a meeting at the Argentine Township Bridge on February 19, 2021; the township will provide 40 tons of fill dirt for the project, and discussion was held on the disposition of the historic bridge. Seiler also advised that Jerry Heiser from Butler will give a presentation on motor grader purchases to the entire board.

Break was taken at 9:51 a.m. and the meeting reconvened at 9:56 a.m.

Public comment was heard from Commissioner Falkenburg about the Keystone Pipeline, and a resolution on making Fall River County a second amendment sanctuary county; Seiler noted the 2020 highway project listing for the board to review that is in their packets. Commissioner Russell spoke of the Cracker Barrell at the Mueller Center, and the discussions on HB1230 (funds for a county improvement fund), HB 1085 J (criteria for Ag land classification), and medical marijuana.

Andersen Engineers requested the board rescind Resolution #2021-4. Motion made by Russell, seconded by Allen, to rescind Resolution 2021-10, a plat of Lot 14R and Tract Seger 2 of Tract Seger 1 Revised, at the February 18, 2021 meeting, due to a legal description that was duplicated.

Discussion was held on property taxes, the most serious county issue right now. Susie Hayes, Director of Equalization, spoke that this is a statewide concern, and that the sales with increased purchase prices are continuing. Local control can happen on budgets and mill levies. Commissioner Russell spoke of a possible forum with the schools in the county. Discussion was held on having an open discussion at a commissioner meeting. Hayes reminded everyone that, if

people do not agree with their assessed value (notices that were sent the last week of February), they need to contact the Equalization office to file an appeal.

Sue Ganje, Auditor, met with the board to present the January 31, 2021 General Fund Surplus Analysis, noting that Covid-19 reimbursement monies were all receipted into the general fund, which caused a surplus. Discussion was held on designating projects like gravel and property tax relief. This will be brought back to the next meeting.

Discussion was held on legislation and how the proposed funding for Shep's Canyon Road did not make it out of committee. The board discussed the need for law enforcement presence, the possibility of lowering the speed limit in areas or the entire road and cutting trees to allow sunlight. Seiler advised the speed limit was originally set by the engineering firm, and that the yellow signs are advisory only. Drivers also need to be responsible.

The 2nd Reading for the Animal Ordinance was held. Motion made by Russell, seconded by Allen, to approve the second reading of the amendment to Article II Regulations: Section 2. Noisy Dogs, as follows:

ORDINANCE #2010-01

ARTICLE II: REGULATIONS

SECTIONS 2. NOISY DOGS

No person may allow any dog under his/her control to habitually make loud noises to disturb or annoy persons who are of ordinary sensibilities. This ordinance section does not apply to working farm or ranch dogs while performing that work which is their essential purpose as a working farm or ranch dog, including, but not necessarily limited to, herding livestock or protecting livestock from predators. To qualify for this exception the owner of the animal must provide sufficient evidence to qualify their animal for the exception. And the land on which the animals are working must qualify as "agricultural land" pursuant to South Dakota code.

With Cope and Greenough voting no, all others voting yes, by roll call vote, motion carries.

WHEREAS, the right of the citizens to keep and bear arms is guaranteed as an individual right under the Second Amendment to United States Constitution and under the Constitution of the State of South Dakota; and

WHEREAS, the right of the citizens to keep and bear arms for the defense of Life, Liberty and Property is regarded as an inalienable right by the citizens of Fall River County, South Dakota; and

Jennifer Sietsema, Black Hills Local Council Government, met with the board to discuss funding options for infrastructure for the United Ranchers Cooperative. Funding is available for public projects, not private. If it is private, there is no role for the County. Sietsema noted more information is needed. Russell stated that she felt the board never really thought about a financial route for them but wanted to show support through resolution. Greenough discussed the cooperative and buy in process. Discussion was held on requirements on some programs, making it difficult to get funding for, but not to give up hope.

Sietsema also discussed the dues structure for Black Hills Council of Local Government, with 9 counties in the West River Division. There has not been an increase in dues for the last 10 years, but once the 2020 Census is complete, dues will change. The City of Hot Springs will be separate from the county from now on, which may help with dues in the future. Edgemont and Oelrichs are covered under the county dues, because they are under 1,000 in population.

Randy Seiler, Highway Superintendent, met with the board to discuss what to do with the old Argentine Bridge, advising that the bridge issue can be worked out between the contractor and the township. Motion made by Allen, seconded by Russell, to approve the Agreements for Voluntary Right-of-Way Donation, project no. BRO8024 (00)19-1, between Fall River County and Donald Andersen and Lynda Andersen, and between Fall River County and Peterson and Son, Inc, and authorize the chairman to sign.

Jerry Heiser, Butler Cat Machinery, presented to the board information on the re-purchase agreements for Caterpillar graders, noting the warranty that covers repairs fully for 7 years. If the county stays with the 7-year update cycle, with the warranty and buy back option, it will cost approximately \$26.15 per hour over the course of 7 years. At a 10-year update cycle, it will cost approximately, \$28.12 per hour to run; at a 13-year update cycle, it will cost \$34.58 per hour to run. These are conservative estimates only and not a future guarantee of a machine's performance.

Sue Ganje, Auditor, met with the board. Motion made by Greenough, seconded by Cope to approve the cash transfer # 1, from the General fund to 911 fund in the amount of \$210,790.25 and from the General fund to Highway fund in the amount of \$1,434.13 for COVID funds received in 2020.

I am pleased to inform you that the Unified Judicial System has secured another year of funding for the Court Security Grant Program to help offset the costs of security improvements in courthouses. Since 1999, the UJS has distributed \$1,339,741 for 410 county grants throughout the state. The money helped pay part of the costs of the projects ranging from the installation of panic alarm systems to purchasing metal detectors and bulletproofing benches. The UJS has \$10,000 available in FY 2021 to help continue the important work of upgrading the security of courthouses throughout the state.

The \$10,000 appropriated by the Legislature for FY2021 may not underwrite all of the projects that are requested for this fiscal year. Therefore, as in the past, we will allocate funding based on the following priorities:

- 1. Purchasing new or upgrading existing panic alarm systems. It is our belief that being able to call law enforcement quickly and quietly in a dangerous situation remains the most effective means for diffusing problems before they spin out of control.
- 2. **Purchasing metal detectors.** We received several requests in the past to purchase hand-held and portable metal detectors for use in the courthouses. We will again assist in funding the purchase of this important equipment.
- 3. Purchasing locks and peepholes for court facilities. As noted in past years' grants, securing facilities can be done very economically by installing locks and peepholes throughout court facilities.

4. Other miscellaneous expenses. These expenses could include bulletproofing benches (we strongly recommend Kevlar for this purpose) and other measures directly related to improving courthouse security.

If your project involves video surveillance, electronic door locks or panic alarms please share a copy of the attached guidelines with your vendors prior to receiving bids. If there are questions about any of the items, please contact the Circuit Court Administrator in your area.

Grant applications should be submitted to Gregory L. Sattizahn, State Court Administrator, 500 East Capitol Avenue, Pierre, South Dakota, 57501-5070 by **April 15, 2021.** Counties will be eligible for up to a 50% match on security expenses, depending on the availability of funding, the above priorities, and the number of projects submitted.

The grant applications should include a cover letter requesting the funds, description of the project and a written cost proposal or estimate from the vendor of the improvements to be made. Verbal quotes will not be accepted. Please contact Aaron Olson at 773-4872 if you have any grant application questions.

I would again like to extend my sincere thanks to those of you who have been attentive to courthouse security issues. Improving courthouse security not only benefits those who work in such facilities, but also the many members of the public who transact business in them. I look forward to working with you in our continuing efforts to improve courthouse security.

Video Surveillance, Electronic Door Locks and Panic Alarm Guidelines

- a. Non-state equipment may not be installed in the state computer rack.
- b. No camera or other installed devices will connect to State network.
- c. No State system will be dual homed to multiple networks. i.e. connected to both the state and county networks
- d. Hardware or software installed on UJS workstations will need to pass a security approval process and will be installed by UJS technical staff.
- e. County staff is responsible for management and operation of county installed security systems including video surveillance or electronic door locks.
- f. If access from UJS computers to security systems such as cameras, door locks or panic alarms is desired, that feature should be included in the vendor solution summary.
- g. The County may need to allow access through their firewall\network in order for UJS workstations to gain access from the internet.

FOOD SERVICE AGREEMENT

This Food Service Partnership Agreement is made and entered into by and between **FALL RIVER JAIL** ("Client"), and **CURA HOSPITALITY, LLC** ("Company") (collectively "the Parties").

1. TERM AND INTENT

- 1.1 Client grants Company the exclusive right to provide Food Service to Client, employees, guests and other persons at the Premises.
- 1.2 This Agreement shall commence on March 1, 2021 (the "Commencement Date") or sooner if mutually agreed upon in writing by both of the Parties. The Agreement will remain in effect through February 28, 2022. The Agreement shall automatically renew for additional like periods, unless either party provides written notice of termination to the other party at least sixty (60) days prior to the expiration date or unless this Agreement is otherwise terminated as set forth herein.

2. DEFINITIONS

- 2.1. <u>Accounting Period</u>. Company's accounting calendar is based on an accounting cycle consisting of four (4) rotational periods of four (4) weeks, four (4) weeks, five (5) weeks.
- 2.2. <u>Agreement</u>. In order of precedence: (i) this Food Service Partnership Agreement, Exhibits and Schedules, as amended and, where specifically included by reference, (ii) the Company's Proposal and (iii) the Solicitation.
- 2.3. <u>Food Service</u>. Operations and Products to be provided by Company in accordance with this Agreement related to the preparation, service and sale of food, beverages, goods, merchandise and other items at the Premises.
- 2.4. <u>Governmental Rule</u>. Any statute, law, rule, regulation, ordinance or code of any governmental entity (whether federal, state, local or otherwise).
- 2.5. <u>Premises</u>. The Client's facility located at 906 N. River Street, Hot Springs, SD 57747.
- 2.6. Products. Food, beverages, goods, merchandise, and supplies.
- 2.7. Proprietary, Confidential and Trade Secret Information. Items used in Company Food Services (owned by or licensed to Company) including, without limitation, menus, signage, surveys, Software (i.e. menu systems, food production systems, accounting systems), recipes, management guidelines and procedures, operating manuals, personnel information, purchasing and distribution practices, pricing and bidding information, financial information, provided, however that the following items are specifically excluded: (i) information generally available to and known by the public or (ii) information independently developed or previously known by the Client.
- 2.8. <u>Servicewares</u>. Items used in the service of food and beverages including, without limitation, chinaware, glassware, silverware, disposables, trays, and carts.
- 2.9. <u>Smallwares</u>. Items used in the preparation of food including, without limitation, pots, pans and kitchen utensils.
- 2.10. <u>Supervisory Employee</u>. Those persons who have directly or indirectly performed management or professional services on behalf of Company for the Client at any time during this Agreement including, without limitation, any corporate employee, manager, assistant manager, chef, lead cook or dietitian.

3. FOOD SERVICES

- 3.1 <u>Food Service</u>. Company will provide food preparation and service of food and beverages to Client's employees, staff and guests. In case of inclement weather which may impede meal delivery, Company Food Service Director, will determine if delivery of meals will cause a safety hazard. The Food Service Director will communicate with the Client to arrange meal pick up by the Client.
- 3.2 **Program Specifications.**
 - A. <u>Menu.</u> Company shall provide menus that meet nutritional requirements for inmate wellness per South Dakota Department of Corrections. Calories per day will be 2,500.
 - B. <u>Hours</u>. Company shall provide necessary Food Services at such hours as the Client and Company mutually agree.
- 3.3 <u>Purchasing</u>. Company shall purchase those Products and supplies necessary to comply with Company's obligations as set forth in this Agreement from Company's approved vendors that meet Company's guidelines and requirements.
- 3.4 <u>Inventory</u>. Company will purchase and own all inventories of food, beverages, and supplies.

4. EMPLOYEES

- 4.1. Employees. Company shall hire employees necessary for its performance of this Agreement. Persons employed by Company will be the employees of Company and not of Client. Company's employees and agents shall comply with applicable rules and regulations concerning conduct on the Client's premises which the Client imposes upon its employees and agents provided such rules and/or regulations are not in violation of any federal, state, and/or local laws. Client agrees to provide Company notice of any proposed changes in rules, at least thirty (30) days prior to implementation. Company will consider Client's written requests to remove Food Service employees, provided such requests are non-discriminatory and comply with all laws and regulations governing employment.
- 4.2. Existing Employees; Employment Terms; Employee Pension and Benefit Plans. Company in its sole discretion may elect to hire any managers or employees of Client or Client's incumbent foodservice provider (collectively, "Existing Employees") who are qualified, available and willing to provide Food Service at the Premises. Company shall have the authority to establish the terms of employment for all current Company managers and employees (including Existing Employees that Company may elect to hire in connection with this Agreement). Client represents that such Existing Employees are not represented by a union and are not entitled to be paid a living or prevailing wage under any Governmental Rule or agreement.
- 4.3. <u>Wages and Hours</u>. Company shall comply with all applicable federal, state and local laws and regulations pertaining to the wages and hours of employment for Company's employees. Client shall comply with all applicable federal, state and local laws and regulations pertaining to the wages and hours of employment for Client's employees.
- 4.4. <u>Payroll Taxes</u>. Company shall be responsible for all withholding and payroll taxes relative to Company's employees. Client shall be responsible for all withholding and payroll taxes relative to Client's employees.
- 4.5. <u>Background Checks</u>. Company shall conduct necessary background checks as required by law.

- 4.6. Equal Opportunity and Affirmative Action Employer. Company abides by the requirements of 41 CFR §§ 60-1.4(a), 60-300.5(a) and 60-741.5(a). These regulations prohibit discrimination against qualified individuals based on their status as protected veterans or individuals with disabilities, and prohibit discrimination against all individuals based on their age, race, color, religion, sex, sexual orientation or national origin. Company employs and promotes individuals without regard to age, race, color, religion, sex, national origin, protected veteran status or disability.
- 4.7. Non-Hire. Client acknowledges that Company has invested considerable amounts of time and money in training its Supervisory Employees. Therefore, the Client agrees that during the Supervisory Employee's employment with Company and for a period of twelve (12) months thereafter no Supervisory Employees of Company will be hired by Client nor any facility affiliated with Client, nor will Client permit employment of Company Supervisory Employees on Client's Premises or the Premises of any facility affiliated with Client. Client agrees that if it violates this provision, Client shall pay to Company and Company shall accept as liquidated damages and not as a penalty, an amount equal to one time the annual salary) of the Supervisory Employee(s) hired by or allowed to work with Client in violation of the terms of this Agreement. Company shall be entitled to pursue all other remedies available under federal, state, or local law. This provision shall survive the termination of this Agreement.

5. PREMISES, FACILITIES, UTILITIES AND EQUIPMENT

6. LICENSES, PERMITS AND TAXES

- 6.1 <u>Licenses and Permits</u>. Company shall procure, maintain and post the food licenses and permits as required by law.
- 6.2 Taxes. Company shall be responsible for collecting and remitting sales tax on applicable sales collected by Company. Unless Client provides documentation of Client's federal and state tax-exempt status to the Company's sole satisfaction, Client shall reimburse Company for state and local sales tax on the full amount of charges and fees billed to the Client. Client shall secure and pay all federal, state and local property, excise and income and other taxes and fees required for the Premises and resulting from the Food Services provided for hereunder. Client shall immediately pay for any tax assessments including interest, penalties, costs and expenses, which are assessed against the Food Service operation and were not in effect as of the Commencement Date or were owed but unpaid as of the Commencement Date. Client shall notify Company promptly should its sales tax status be changed.

7. FINANCIAL ARRANGEMENTS

7.1 Payment Arrangement.

- A. Inmate Meal Rate.
 - a. <u>Flat Rate</u> Client shall pay Company the amount of Six Dollars and Twenty-Five Cents (\$6.25) per meals

The rate shall not include charges for floor stock, nourishments, supplements, etc. These will be provided at actual cost plus 10% billed to Client.

- C. <u>Service and Pricing Assumptions</u>. The financial terms set forth in this Agreement, and all other obligations assumed by Company hereunder, are based on the following assumptions:
 - 1. Population:
 - 2. Average Sales:
 - 3. Patient Days:
 - 4. Hours of Operation:
 - 5. Purchasing: Company will make purchases on behalf of the Client at a level similar to that in place at the Commencement of this Agreement.

To the extent any of the basic assumptions change or if Client requests a significant change in Services as provided under this Agreement, the Company's base rate shall be proportionately increased, unless the Parties otherwise mutually agree otherwise.

- 7.2 Payments Due Dates, Method and Late Payment Penalty. Company shall issue an invoice at the end of each Accounting Period showing the amounts due. Client shall pay the full invoice amount within thirty (30) days from the issuance of the invoice. Payment Method shall be electronic via AFT/ACH transfer or another acceptable electronic method agreed upon between the parties. In the event payment is not made within thirty (30) days of the due date, the invoice will be subject to a finance charge of eighteen percent (18%) per annum or, if less, the maximum amount permitted under applicable law. The right of Company to charge the finance charge shall not be construed as a waiver of Company's normal entitlement to receive timely payment as set forth herein.
- 7.3 Right to Offset. In the event that Client is more than thirty (30) days past due on any obligations to Company, Company shall have the right to offset, from any other sums owed by Company to Client, all or any portion of such outstanding receivables. Additionally, Company shall have the right, at Company's option, at any time that Client is over thirty (30) days past due on any obligations require that Client pay, on a prebilling basis, at least one week in advance of each Accounting Period, the estimated amount due Company for that Accounting Period. The estimated amount shall be adjusted and reconciled to the actual amount in the next prebilling invoice, or if Client is no longer past due on its obligations to Company, with the next invoice due hereunder. Further, Company shall have the right to immediately adjust hours, prices, labor and menu offerings to further off-set any losses.
- 7.4 <u>Change in Conditions</u>. The financial terms set forth in this Agreement, and all other obligations assumed by Company hereunder, are based on conditions in existence on the date Company commences operations including, without limitation, population; labor costs; applicable Governmental Rules; food and supply costs; provision of equipment and utilities; state of the Premises; and federal, state and local sales, use and excise taxes (the "Conditions"). Further, Client acknowledges that in connection with the negotiation and execution of this Agreement, Company has relied upon Client's representations regarding existing and future conditions (the "Representations"). In the event of change in the Conditions, inaccuracy of the Representations, or if Client requests any significant change in the Food Services as provided under this Agreement, the financial terms and other obligations assumed by Company shall be renegotiated to reflect a

- proportionate increase in Company's charges to the Client. Company will provide a thirty (30) day notice of such increased charges.
- 7.5 <u>Future Pricing</u>. Pricing adjustments shall be made on an annual basis and shall be agreed upon by the parties at a rate no less than the greater of: three percent (3%) or the most recently released U.S. Department of Labor Consumer Price Index, All Urban Consumers, National Average Unadjusted, Food Away From Home. Up to ninety (90) days prior to the anniversary of the Commencement Date, Company shall provide Client notification of the adjustment. On the anniversary date, Company proposed adjustments shall go into effect, unless the Parties have entered into a written agreement with an alternative cost adjustment.
- 7.6 <u>Attorney's Fees and Costs</u>. Client shall pay all costs of collecting any amount due Company, including attorney's fees and all costs and other expenses incurred by Company in collecting an indebtedness of Client. This provision shall survive the termination of the Agreement.

8. TERMINATION OF THE AGREEMENT.

- 8.1 Termination for Non-Performance. If either party refuses, fails or is unable to perform or observe any of the terms or conditions of this Agreement for any reason other than for Excused Performance as set forth in this Agreement, the party claiming such deficiency shall provide the breaching party written notice of any such breach. If the breaching party remedies such breach within (i) three (3) days in the case of failure to make payment when due, (ii) fifteen (15) days in the case of any other breach, or (iii) a reasonable time where cure is not possible within fifteen (15) days (collectively the "Notice Period"), the notice shall be null and void. If the breaching party fails to remedy the breach within the Notice Period, the party giving notice may cancel the Agreement after the end of the Notice Period.
- 8.2 <u>Termination for Financial Insecurity</u>. If either Party makes an unauthorized assignment for the benefit of creditors, files a petition under the bankruptcy or insolvency laws of any jurisdiction, has or suffers a receiver or trustee to be appointed for its business or property, or is adjudicated a bankrupt or an insolvent, the other party may terminate the Agreement with three (3) days' notice. Provided, however, that Client agrees to provide Company thirty (30) days' notice before filing a petition for bankruptcy.
- 8.3 <u>Voluntary Termination</u>. Either Party may terminate this Agreement with or without cause by written notice to the other party given not less than ninety (90) days prior to the effective date of termination.
- 8.4 <u>Continuing Obligations</u>. The termination of this Agreement shall not affect the rights, privileges, or liabilities of the Parties as they exist as of the effective date of termination. All outstanding amounts owed to Company shall become due and payable immediately upon termination. If, at Client's request, Company enters into agreements with one or more third parties in connection with its management of Client's Food Service operations (collectively, "<u>Third Party Agreements</u>"), Client agrees, at Client's sole cost and expense, to: (i) assume and undertake (or cause to be assumed and undertaken by the Food Service provider succeeding Company) all responsibilities of Company under all Third Party Agreements from and after the date this Agreement expires or is earlier terminated; (ii) release Company from all liability associated with such Third Party Agreements from and after the date this Agreement expires or is earlier terminated; and (iii) bear all liability and responsibility with respect to any costs, fees and other charges associated with

termination of such Third Party Agreements. This Paragraph shall survive the termination or expiration of this Agreement.

9. INDEMNIFICATION; INSURANCE

- 9.1 <u>Insurance</u>. Company shall maintain their own insurance on their respective real property, equipment and contents. Upon request, evidence of such insurance shall be provided in the form of a certificate of insurance.
 - A. <u>Company Insurance</u>. Company shall procure and maintain the following insurance:
 - 1. Worker's Compensation Insurance as prescribed by the laws of the state where the Premises are located; and
 - 2. Comprehensive General Liability Insurance, with limits of two million dollars (\$2,000,000.00) per occurrence and two million dollars (\$2,000,000.00) annual aggregate to cover any and all claims that arise during the course of this Agreement.
 - C. <u>Subrogation</u>. Client and Company waive any and all right of recovery from each other for property damage or loss of use thereof, however occurring, which loss is insured under a valid and collectible insurance policy to the extent of any recovery collectible under such insurance. This waiver shall include, but not be limited to, losses covered by policies of fire, extended coverage, boiler explosion and sprinkler leakage. This waiver shall not apply to claims for personal death or injury. Company shall not be liable to the Client, in any way for damage to the Facilities or Premises caused by reason of fire, or other hazard, however caused, or by the reason of an act of God. In any event, Company shall not be held liable for any cause to an extent which would exceed effective coverage and dollar limits prevailing under the policies of insurance described in this Agreement.
- 9.2 <u>Indemnification</u>. Each Party agrees to provide the following indemnification:
 - A. Each party agrees that it will defend, indemnify and hold harmless the other party, its officers, directors, parent corporation, affiliates, employees and agents ("Indemnified Parties") against any and all liabilities, losses, damages, injuries, deaths, reasonable litigation expenses (including, without limitation, reasonable attorneys' fees), costs and costs of court (collectively, "Damages") which Indemnified Parties may hereafter sustain, incur or be required to pay arising out of the other party's negligent acts, omissions or failure to perform obligations pursuant to this Agreement. Provided, however, neither party shall be required to defend, indemnify and hold harmless the other party for any intentional or criminal actions of the other party or its employees, visitors or invitees. Client agrees to defend, indemnify and hold harmless Company Indemnified Parties from all Damages which may arise due to any act or omission of a Company Party made in compliance with a Client's rules or requirements.
 - B. <u>Notice of Indemnification</u>. A party shall only be required to indemnify pursuant to the Agreement, where that party receives a written request to indemnify within twenty (20) days after the initial receipt of notice of any such lawsuit or claim by the party requesting indemnification. Failure to notify a party of such claim or lawsuit within the stated period of time shall relieve that party of any and all responsibility and liability under this Agreement to defend, indemnify and hold harmless for that claim or lawsuit.

Upon termination of this Agreement, Client shall return all Company Proprietary, Confidential and Trade Secret Information in Client's possession relating to Company's services pursuant to this Agreement. Client agrees that upon breaching this provision, Company shall be entitled to equitable relief, including injunction or specific performance, in addition to all other available remedies. This provision shall survive the termination of the Agreement.
- 10.2 <u>Intellectual Property</u>. Nothing in this Agreement is intended to grant any rights to Client under any patent, copyright, trademark, trade name, trade secret or other proprietary right of Company (whether now owned or hereafter developed or acquired), all of which are reserved to Company.
- 10.3 <u>Independent Contractor Relationship</u>. It is mutually understood and agreed, and it is the intent of the Parties, that an independent contractor relationship is hereby established under the terms and conditions of this Agreement. Employees of Company are not, nor shall they be deemed to be, employees of Client. Employees of Client are not, nor shall they be deemed to be, employees of Company.
- 10.4 <u>Notice</u>. Any notice required under this Agreement shall be deemed to have been sufficiently provided when delivered by hand, or three days after being sent by certified or registered mail return receipt requested, or by overnight delivery service with receipt of delivery, provided such delivery is to the parties at the following addresses:





\$.54/mile patrolled

Wages at the prevailing rate of \$25.00/hour.

II. PATROL ACTIVITIES:

A. Time schedules for patrols will be flexible to allow for emergencies, other priorities, and day-to-day needs of both Cooperator and the U.S. Forest Service. Ample time will be spent in each area to make residents and visitors aware that law enforcement officers are in the vicinity.



B. Patrol on the following U.S. Forest Service roads, campgrounds, developed sites, or dispersed areas:

Nebraska National Forests and Grasslands

To make not less than six (6) vehicular patrols to western Fall River Country during the antelope season. These patrols are figured on the basis of 150 miles and 6 man-hours per patrol. Trip logs will be furnished to the Forest Service.

To make not less than two (2) vehicular patrols to western Fall River County the opening weekend of deer season. These patrols are figured on a basis of 150 miles and 6 man-hours per patrol. Trip logs will be furnished to the Forest Service.

Total reimbursement for this category shall not exceed the amount of: \$3,600.00.

Black Hills National Forest

To make vehicular patrols to the Keith Memorial Park and Cascade Falls. Patrols to begin May 2021 and continue through September 2021. Patrols will be conducted based on the agreed upon hourly rate and mileage in Section I-B above. Expenditures will not exceed the amount specified below. This will cover approximately 40 patrols. Patrols will be scheduled with varying hours.

Total reimbursement for this category shall not exceed the amount of: \$3,600.00.

Cooperator personnel assigned to Item 1 above will record names, addresses, and acts of persons involved in possible violation of Federal regulations and turn information over to the Forest Service law enforcement. If court appearances are necessary, Cooperator personnel will appear as witnesses.

Cooperator personnel assigned to Item 1 above will be regular employees of the Fall River County Sheriff's Department. All patrols will be with an official vehicle equipped with Sheriff's Department decals and law enforcement lights.

Total reimbursement for this category shall not exceed the amount of: \$7,200.00.

III. SPECIAL ENFORCEMENT SITUATIONS:

- A. Special Enforcement Situations include but are not limited to: Fire Emergencies, Drug Enforcement, and certain Group Gatherings.
- B. Funds available for special enforcement situations vary greatly from year to year and must be specifically requested and approved prior to any reimbursement being authorized. Requests for funds should be made to the U.S. Forest Service designated representative listed in Item I-A of this Annual Operating Plan. The designated representative will then notify the Cooperator whether funds will be authorized for



reimbursement. If funds are authorized, the parties will then jointly prepare a revised Annual Operating Plan.

- Drug Enforcement: This will be handled on a case by case basis. The request will
 normally come from the patrol Captain; however, it may come from the Special
 Agent in Charge or their designated representative. Reimbursement shall be made
 at the rates specified in Section I-B. Deputies assigned to the incident will
 coordinate all of their activities with the designated officer in charge of the
 incident.
- 2. Fire Emergency: During emergency fire suppression situations and upon request by the Forest Service pursuant to an incident resource order, the Cooperator agrees to provide special services beyond those provided under Section II-A, within the Cooperator's resource capabilities, for the enforcement of State and local laws related to the protection of persons and their property. The Cooperator will be compensated at the rate specified in Section I-B; the Forest Service will specify times and schedules. Upon concurrence of the local patrol Captain or their designated representative, an official from the Incident Management Team managing the incident, Cooperator personnel assigned to an incident where meals are provided will be entitled to such meals.
- 3. Group Gatherings: This includes but is not limited to situations which are normally unanticipated, or which typically include very short notices, large group gatherings such as rock concerts, demonstrations, and organization rendezvous. Upon authorization by a Forest Service representative listed in Section I-A for requested services of this nature, reimbursement shall be made at the rates specified in Section I-B. Deputies assigned to this type of incident will normally coordinate their activities with the designated officer in charge of the incident.

Thank you for contacting me about the Keystone XL Pipeline. I appreciate hearing from you.

On January 20, 2021, President Biden revoked the permit for the Keystone XL pipeline, making one of his first acts as president the cancellation of a modern infrastructure project that was already under construction and the elimination of up to 11,000 high-paying American jobs. Canceling the pipeline also sidelined \$1.7 billion in pledged renewable energy development to fully offset the pipeline's greenhouse gas emissions. Prior to the president's announcement, I led the South Dakota congressional delegation in urging the president to reconsider canceling the pipeline, which would provide hundreds of millions in wages, steer needed tax revenue to states and municipalities along the route, and strengthen our trade relations with Canada.

The Biden administration is determined to transition away from oil and gasoline, but that is not something that can be done overnight. Modern pipelines provide a cleaner and safer way to transport oil, with the added benefit of alleviating rail traffic to free up capacity for our farmers. Responsible infrastructure planning should explore realistic opportunities to reduce emissions while still meeting the energy demands of Americans and enabling economic growth. While I know some may disagree, I believe the Keystone XL pipeline could serve as a model for such infrastructure and energy development.

As Congress continues to consider this issue, I will be sure to keep your concerns in mind. Thank you for contacting me to share your thoughts on the Keystone XL pipeline (KXL).

As you may know, the original phase of KXL has been operational since 2010. An expansion of the current pipeline was proposed in 2008. It would begin in Alberta, Canada and run through Montana and South Dakota before joining the existing pipeline in Nebraska. Since the pipeline would cross international borders, a permit from the U.S. Department of State was required. After a decade of environmental studies and deliberations, President Trump approved the permit, which President Biden has since revoked.

I wrote a letter to President Biden the week before the permit was cancelled. I have since cosponsored the Keystone XL Pipeline Construction and Jobs Preservation Act, which would authorize the construction and operation of the Keystone XL pipeline without a presidential permit.

Political decisions, good and bad, have implications on real people, which is why I recently hosted a roundtable in Philip with more than 20 small business owners to learn more about how President Biden's Executive Order impacted them individually. I was grateful Reps. Armstrong (ND) and Newhouse (WA) joined me in Philip and we will take these stories back to the halls of Congress.

Thank you for contacting me about the Sabika Sheikh Firearm Licensing and Registration Act (H.R. 127).

As a National Rifle Association member and a gun owner myself, I am a strong supporter of the right to keep and bear arms. Enshrined in the Constitution by our nation's founders, this right must be upheld and defended. The Second Amendment is not a law that we should change on a whim, and I oppose any efforts which attempt to strip it of its meaning. I am opposed to H.R. 127, which seeks to create a public federal registry for firearms and ammunition, among other egregious constitutional overreaches.

You can count on me to be a strong voice for gun owners in South Dakota. In fact, one of my first actions of this Congress was to cosponsor the Concealed Carry Reciprocity Act, H.R. 38. This bill would allow gunowners with state-issued concealed carry licenses, or residents of constitutional carry states, to conceal a handgun in any other state, as long as the permit holder follows the laws of that state.



Thank you for contacting me about the Sabika Sheikh Firearm Licensing and Registration Act. I appreciate hearing from you.

As you know, the Sabika Sheikh Firearm Licensing and Registration Act (H.R. 127) was introduced in the U.S. House of Representatives on January 4, 2021. If enacted, this bill would require an individual to obtain a license to purchase or possess a firearm or ammunition. Additionally, the bill would establish a public firearms database and require an annual firearm insurance fee of \$800. Special licensure would be required for the ownership of firearms included on an expansive list detailed within the bill. This legislation has been referred to the House Committee on the Judiciary. A companion bill has not been introduced in the Senate.

As your U.S. senator, a gun owner, and a hunter, I strongly support the Second Amendment, which protects "the right of the people to keep and bear arms." While others may disagree, I firmly believe the plain language of the Second Amendment guarantees the individual right of law-abiding citizens to own firearms. I recognize the importance of keeping criminals and high-risk individuals from obtaining and using firearms. However, I question whether additional laws will prevent high-risk individuals from acquiring firearms when the laws and reporting procedures currently on the books are not being fully enforced.

In my time in Congress, I have consistently opposed any attempt to establish a federal firearm registry or to require so-called universal background checks. Such federal overreach would infringe upon the privacy of law-abiding citizens and impose burdensome costs and liabilities on private sellers.

As Congress considers legislation regarding the Second Amendment, I will be sure to keep your concerns in mind. 


