WHEREAS, the right of the citizens to keep and bear arms for the defense of Life, Liberty and Property is regarded as an inalienable right by the citizens of Fall River County, South Dakota; and

WHEREAS, the citizens of Fall River County, South Dakota, derive economic benefit from all safe forms of firearm recreation, hunting and shooting conducted within Fall River County as allowed under the United States and South Dakota Constitutions, and

WHEREAS, it is the desire of the Fall River County Board of County Commissioners to declare its support of the Second Amendment to the Constitution of the United States of America and Article 6, Section 24 of the Constitution of the State of South Dakota protecting citizens' right to keep and bear arms; and

WHEREAS, the members of the Fall River County Board of County Commissioners took an oath to support and defend the Constitutions of the United States and of the State of South Dakota.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Fall River County Board of County Commissioners strongly supports the Second Amendment of the Constitution of the United States of America and Article 6, Section 24 of the Constitution of the State of South Dakota and that the Board strongly believes that it is the right of the citizens of Bennett County to keep and bear arms for the defense of life, liberty and property; and

FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED, to defend the rights and liberties of the citizens of Fall River County, the Bennett County Board of County Commissioners hereby declares:

Fall River County, South Dakota a "Second Amendment Sanctuary County."



5.4 Payroll Deductions

The county is required to withhold Federal Income Tax, Medicare, and Social Security (FICA) from each employee's paycheck. Changes employees want must be provided to the County Auditor's office by the first working day of the month. Other deductions may include:

- 1. Employee contribution to the Retirement System;
- 2. Employee contribution to Health, Eye or Dental Insurance;
- 3. Court ordered payments;
- 4. Any other benefits approved by County Commissioners as eligible for payroll deduction.

5.5 Changes of Employee Status & Address

It is the employee's responsibility to inform the County Auditor's office of any changes in name, address and telephone number. An employee must immediately report any of the above changes. Failure to report or the intentional withholding of such information may result in disciplinary procedures.

5.6 Travel and Reimbursement of Expenses

It is the policy of the county that employees be reimbursed for necessary and reasonable job related travel expenses. County approved expense reimbursement forms can be found in the Auditor's Office and all receipts must be attached.

5.7 Travel Approval Required

All travel outside the County, which includes an overnight stay, must be approved by the County Commission and recorded in the official county commission minutes prior to the date of travel except in emergency instances where the department head and County Commission Chairperson may approve the travel.

5.8 Travel Expenses

Meals will be paid for only when employees are traveling outside of Fall River County on overnight trips, see exception for Sheriff's Office below. Day trip meals are the responsibility of each individual employee. Lodging will only be paid for when traveling outside of a 50-mile radius of Hot Springs, unless approved by the County Commission.

Same day travel: Meals may be reimbursed for Sheriff's Office Personal engaged on prisoner transport outside of Fall River County during meal times. Same day travel meal reimbursement is at the discretion of the Sheriff. County credit cards cannot be used when purchasing said meals. Meal receipts and travel report must be turned in to the Auditor's Office. Reimbursement will be processed with payroll as taxable income.

5.9 Mileage Rate

Mileage shall be paid at the state mileage rate based on actual mileage, unless otherwise set by the County Commissioners. In order to control travel costs, all employees and elected officials are encouraged to share rides or use a county vehicle. If multiple employees are traveling to the same location for the same event as few as possible vehicles are to be used.

POLICY #16: COUNTY CREDIT CARD USE

16.1 Offices to have Cards

Credit cards will be located at and only be used by the following departments:

- Courthouse:
 - o County Treasurer
 - County Auditor
 - o and any other designated holders as determined by the County Commissioners
- Highway Department:
 - o Highway Superintendent
- Sheriff Department:
 - o Sheriff
 - o Deputy Sheriffs
 - o Civil Transport Deputy
- Emergency Management:
 - Supervisor

16.2 Card Use

The credit cards will only be used for the following purposes:

- Travel:
 - Hotel room lodging and/or deposits to hold rooms for authorized, official travel on County business
 - o gas expense
 - o meal expenses (only on overnight travel) [excludes items such as soft drinks, candy, etc]
- Equipment and supply vendors:
 - When the County does not have an account or is not expected to have an account;
 - o Instances where the use of the card would result in beneficial terms for the county.

County credit cards will not be used for cash advances of any kind, or for any other purpose not specifically authorized by this policy.

16.3 Card Use Review

The Board of Commissioners shall, on a monthly basis, review the credit card statement to ensure all transactions shown on the card comply with this policy. Transactions that do not appear to comply with the policy shall be reported to the full Board immediately.

16.4 Report of Card Use

All receipts must be promptly remitted to the Auditor (within 5 business days of returning from said trip). Any charges that cannot be properly identified or which are not made in conformity with County policy shall be paid immediately by the user of the card. Charges to be reimbursed shall include any interest and all other related charges made by the credit card company.

16.5 Discipline for Card Misuse

Any officer or employee who uses a County credit card in a manner contrary to this policy shall be subject to disciplinary actions as determined by the Board of County Commissioners.

16.5 Card Benefit

All benefits, refunds, rebates and other incentives from the use of a credit card shall belong solely to the County and shall not benefit an individual.

16.6 Change in Limit

Card limit increase requests must be made to the County Commissioners.

FALL RIVER COUNTY RESOLUTION # 2015 - 15

WHEREAS, it appears that certain circumstances require the use of a credit card for financial purposes in the County, and

WHEREAS, Fall River County previously authorized the use of a credit card by Resolution #2005-32; and

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Fall River County Commissioners authorize the use of such cards with the following conditions:

- 1) The credit cards will be located at and only be used by the following:
 - a) Courthouse: County Treasurer and County Auditor, and any other designated holders as determined by the County Commissioners
 - b) Highway Department: Highway Superintendent
 - c) Sheriff Department: Sheriff, Deputy Sheriffs and Civil Transport Deputy
 - d) Emergency Management: Supervisor
- 2) The credit cards will only be used for the following purposes:
 - a) Hotel room lodging and/or deposits to hold rooms for authorized, official travel on County business, and
 - b) Equipment and supply vendors with which the County does not have an account or is not expected to have an account; or instances where the use of the card would result in beneficial terms for the county.
 - c) Travel purposes, including gas expenses and meals purchased while on over-night travel; exclusions include meals purchased under the meal allowance guidelines and items such as soft drinks, candy, etc.
- 3) A credit card may not be used for cash advances of any kind, or for any other purpose not specifically authorized by this policy.
- 4) The Board of Commissioners shall, on a monthly basis, review the credit card statement to ensure all transactions shown on the card comply with this policy. Transactions that do not appear to comply with the policy shall be reported to the full Board immediately.
- 5) All receipts must be promptly remitted to the Auditor. Any charges that cannot be properly identified or which are not made in conformity with County policy shall be paid immediately by the user of the card. Charges to be reimbursed shall include any

interest and all other related charges made by the credit card company. Any officer or employee who uses a County credit card in a manner contrary to this policy shall be subject to disciplinary actions as determined by the Board of County Commissioners.

- 6) All benefits, refunds, rebates and other incentives from the use of a credit card shall belong solely to the County and shall not benefit an individual.
- 7) Card rate increase requests must be made to the County Commissioners.

Subj: Commission Update

- 1. <u>Fall River County Resolution</u>: The SD Department of Agriculture, WFS requires a resolution designating individuals that are authorized to order resources for fire incidents. I have provided the resolution for consideration.
- 2. <u>Homeland Security Grant:</u> I completed the HLS grant for the Sheriff's Office for vehicle computers and printers and submitted the application to the state. The dollar figure for the grant is \$50,880.00. The regional HLS meeting is scheduled for March 16th at 10a in Rapid City. Each county has two representatives (Emergency Manager and Law Enforcement) to review the applications for Region 4 and rank the applications for funding. (Attachment)
- 3. <u>Hazardous Materials Plan:</u> I have submitted a grant application to the state to update the plan for Fall River County. The grant request is for \$5,000. The plan is required to be updated every 5 years and the current plan expires in 2021.
- 4. <u>Bureau of Reclamation Exercise</u>: The annual Angustura Dam exercise is scheduled for March 11th and will be done virtually.

Southwestern SD Overview: Historically, March marks the beginning of a secondary fire season across the southwestern SD. Four of the largest five fires occurred during the dry March of the year 2000. Look for a lack of snowpack due long-term above average temperatures. Generally the largest fires occur in west to northwest winds during a cold front passage when temperature are above average.

Southwestern SD March 2021 Outlook:

Fire Potential is Moderate*

- Above average temperatures expected through the month
- Below average precipitation expected
- Current snowpack is limited to eastern sections of division
 - Should completely melt by 6 March
- Prairies just east and south of the Black Hills are at highest threat

FACT SHEET: President Biden to Take Action to Uphold Commitment to Restore Balance on Public Lands and Waters, Invest in Clean Energy Future

WASHINGTON, D.C. — President Joe Biden will sign an <u>Executive Order</u> today that will help restore balance on public lands and waters, create jobs, and provide a path to align the management of America's public lands and waters with our nation's climate, conservation, and clean energy goals.

In implementing the Executive Order, the Department of the Interior will engage diverse stakeholders across the country, as well as conduct formal consultation with Tribes in recognition of the U.S. government's trust responsibilities.

HITTING PAUSE ON NEW OIL AND GAS LEASING

The Executive Order will direct the Department of the Interior to pause new oil and natural gas leasing on public lands and offshore waters, concurrent with a comprehensive review of the federal oil and gas program. The targeted pause **does not impact** existing operations or permits for valid, existing leases, which are continuing to be reviewed and approved. The order does not restrict energy activities on private or state lands, or lands that the United States holds in trust or restricted status for Tribes or individual Indians.

The President's action will provide a chance to **review** the federal oil and gas program to ensure that it serves the public interest and to **restore balance** on America's public lands and waters to benefit current and future generations. Fossil fuel extraction on public lands accounts for nearly a quarter of all U.S. greenhouse gas emissions. Irresponsible leasing of public lands and waters impacts communities' access to clean air, clean water, and outdoor recreation; carves up important wildlife habitat; and threatens cultural and sacred sites. Multiple bills in Congress have been introduced in recent years to reform the outdated program, including those to better ensure the public is not shut out of land management and leasing decisions; to address the mounting cleanup and remediation costs of orphan wells scattered across the country; and to provide a fair return to taxpayers for the use of their resources.

The oil and gas industry has stockpiled millions of acres of leases on public lands and waters.

- Onshore, of the more than 26 million acres under lease to the oil and gas industry, nearly 13.9 million (or 53%) of those acres are unused and nonproducing.
- Offshore, of the more than 12 million acres of public waters under lease, over 9.3 million (or 77%) of those acres are unused and non-producing.
- Onshore and offshore, the oil and gas industry is sitting on approximately 7,700 unused, approved permits to drill.

The Trump administration conducted a fire sale of public lands and waters, offering more than 25 million acres onshore during the past four years, 5.6 million of which were purchased. Offshore, more than 78 million acres were offered for

lease to oil, gas, and mineral development offshore, and only 5 million acres were purchased.

CREATING JOBS BY INVESTING IN RENEWABLE ENERGY & RESTORATION

As part of President Biden's efforts to Build Back Better and pursue a clean energy future, the administration has committed to making investments to **create millions of family-supporting and union jobs** in clean energy generation, land restoration, abandoned mine cleanup, plugging of orphan oil and gas wells, energy efficiency, clean transportation, advanced manufacturing, and sustainable agriculture across America. Today's Executive Order will call for the Interior Department to identify steps to accelerate responsible development of renewable energy on public lands and waters, including setting a goal to double renewable energy production from offshore wind by 2030. The Department will immediately begin a review of processes and procedures to date as it re-invests in a rigorous renewable energy program.

It also calls for the establishment of a new Climate Conservation Corps Initiative to put a new generation of Americans to work conserving and restoring public lands and waters, increasing reforestation, increasing carbon sequestration in the agricultural sector, protecting biodiversity, improving access to recreation, and addressing the changing climate.

CONSERVING 30% OF AMERICA'S LANDS AND OCEAN BY 2030

The Executive Action will direct the Interior Department to outline steps to achieve the President's commitment to conserve at least 30% each of our lands and waters by the year 2030, as recommended by scientists, in order to safeguard our health, food supplies, biodiversity, and the prosperity of every community. Interior will undertake the process with broad engagement, including agricultural and forest landowners, fishermen, outdoor enthusiasts, sovereign Tribal nations, States, Territories, local officials, and others to identify strategies that reflect the priorities of all communities.

The Biden Administration will work to achieve this 30x30 goal by **supporting local**, **state**, **private**, **and tribally led nature conservation and restoration efforts** that

are underway across America. Over the coming months, Interior will evaluate how to best measure and assess the country's progress toward the 30x30 goal, to properly account for the many innovative and effective ways that communities are conserving their lands and waters for current and future generations. Interior will consider ways to achieve more equitable access to nature and its benefits for all people in America.

Approximately 60% of land in the continental U.S. is in a natural state, but we are losing a football field worth of it every 30 seconds. The decline of nature threatens wildlife; across the globe, approximately one million animal and plant species are at risk of extinction in the coming decades, <u>including one-third of U.S. wildlife</u>.

The <u>U.S. Geological Survey reports</u> that only 12% of lands are permanently protected. Studies show that roughly 23% of America's ocean is currently strongly protected, with the vast majority of ocean protections found in the western Pacific Ocean.




