Disaster Declaration Resolution

WHEREAS, Fall River County, South Dakota on March 15, 2021 through still ongoing has suffered severe storm damage caused by a heavy wet snowstorm resulting in widespread flooding issues, and

NOW IT BE RESOLVED THAT the Fall River County Commissioners do hereby declare a disaster for the population of the area impacted.

The Fall River County Commissioners respectfully request that any and all assistance that may be available from State and Federal agencies be provided to all local governments to include Fall River County and to the local businesses and the general population as we work to overcome this disaster.

BE IT ALSO RESOLVED THAT the Fall River County Commissioners do hereby declare a flooding and winter storm disaster and respectfully request the Governor of the State of South Dakota to declare a disaster area and to request a Presidential Declaration of Disaster to insure that the maximum amount of assistance is made available to local governments, business and residents affected.

Fall River County Resolution 2021-22 Drought Disaster Resolution

BE IT ALSO RESOLVED THAT the Fall River County Commissioners do hereby commit all local, state and federal resources to provide assistance in preventing large wildfires and producer losses due to the existing drought conditions and assistance be made available to local governments, businesses and residents affected.

Dustin Ross, Andersen Engineers, met with the board. Motion made by Russell, seconded by Allen, to approve the following resolution:

Teresa Pullen, Treasurer, met with the board. Motion made by Russell, seconded by Allen, to approve the low bid from Sanders Sanitation, in the amount of \$434.00 for 30 days, for a roll off container for the cleanup of the storage unit.

Pullen gave an update on the clean-up progress at the storage building, and that when completed, a list will be compiled to surplus items. The remaining items will be put up for auction. Purplewave.com only wants big equipment; they are not interested in office equipment.

Pullen spoke of the non-sufficient funds checks process - after 30 days the Treasurer's office turns it over to the State's Attorney's office, where they have up to 6 months to collect. Discussion was also held on an upcoming tax deed sale, noting a few properties she needs advice on from State's Attorney Russell.

Stacey Martin, GIS, met with the board to present a power point on the Riparian Buffer Strip Tax Incentives. 2021 Legislature passed House Bill 1042, which amended SDCL 10-6.-31.7 & 10-6-31.8. Martin noted qualifications – location, size, management and the October 16th deadline to submit their application to the Director of Equalization. If the application is approved, it is good for a 10-year period or until a change in use or ownership of land. The amendment included the increase to 10 years for the tax incentive, and the value reduction that will now be 50%. Martin provided a list of agriculture deedholders that could apply.

Agricultural soil tables were briefly discussed; this will also be addressed at the May 14, 2021 Black Hills Association of County Commissioners meeting at Prairie Wind Casino.

Joe Messino, Mayor of the Town of Oelrichs, met with the board to ask about plans for repairs to Oelrichs Main Street (Old HWY 79). Grant applications for repair have yet to be approved, patching problem areas do not seem to work, and there are issues during snowstorms. Bituminous Paving, Inc. has the bid for the Highway 385 project that will end at Oelrichs, so Seiler will meet with them and see if they will give a quote for asphalt paving. Messino will take that plan to his town board.

Randy Seiler, Highway Superintendent, met with the board. Motion made by Greenough, seconded by Russell, to approve the Golden West Telecommunication's Application for Permit to Occupy County Highway Right-of-Way from an existing vault near 28558 Old HWY 18 to approximately 2.6 miles east to another existing vault to replace a section of bad cable.

Seiler updated the board on the Chilson Bridge, noting that the tribe wants to do another walk over, but bid letting is still set for May. It has not yet been found that the bridge at Igloo belongs to the county. A 404 Permit is still needed for the Argentine Bridge project, but it is also set to be bid in May. Seiler also advised that there will be LTAP training on road graders for employees, later in April, that commissioners can attend as well.

Seiler provided a map on county roads and spoke of snow removal after winter storms, noting that school bus routes in the Oral and lake area have priority. With the recent storm, although all roads were cleared for travel in two days, there were challenges that included the amount of snow, blading while no frost was in the ground, road graders getting stuck, a family emergency that took away one operator, and the white out they experienced. Employees worked fourteen-hour days after that storm. The highway department followed up on Wednesday and Thursday. Commissioners spoke of phone call complaints and the need for better planning. Russell and Allen noted the Code of the West previously adopted, and discussion was also on additional training for the newer operators. Falkenburg also was hopeful that additional training and the upcoming LTAP class would help.

Public comment was heard from Sheriff Evans reporting that there are 16 males and 3 females in the Fall River County Jail and 3 males and 1 female in the Pennington County Jail, with 1 inmate on work release, for a total of 24 inmates. Mike Ortner reported that prior county commissioner Anne Cassens is now a 4th grade teacher in Utah, and Charity Mantis would like the board to consider designating March 29, 2022 as Welcome Home Vietnam Veterans Day, Mantis will remind them in February of 2022. Falkenburg spoke about the 30X30 Federal Land Plan, registering firearms, wealth tax, and other current issues in the country. Russell encourages people to look beyond the titles of bills.

The Fall River Board of County Commissioners met in regular session on April 15, 2021. Present: Joe Allen, Les Cope (via phone), Joe Falkenburg, Heath Greenough, Deb Russell and Sue Ganje, Auditor.

The Pledge of Allegiance was given, and the meeting called to order at 9:00 a.m.

The agenda was reviewed for conflicts; none were noted. ALL MOTIONS RECORDED IN THESE MINUTES WERE PASSED BY UNANIMOUS VOTE, UNLESS OTHERWISE STATED. The full context of the meeting can be found on the county website under Commissioners at http://fallriver.sdcounties.org, or, under Fall River County Commission, SD at http://www.YouTube.com.

Motion made by Greenough, seconded by Allen, to approve the agenda as written.

Motion made by Russell, seconded by Allen, to approve the minutes for March 25, 2021. Minutes for April 1, 2021 were not available.

Motion made by Greenough, seconded by Russell, to surplus to sell the 1990 Chevrolet maroon pickup. The 2001 Honda Foreman 5 4X4 four-wheeler with a 24.5-gallon Jackrabbit sprayer with handgun will be retained until an appraisal is done and a minimum bid set.

Frank Maynard, Emergency Management, met with the board. Motion made by Greenough, seconded by Allen, to approve the OEM single signature form for the 2nd quarter, and authorize the chairman to sign.

The South Dakota Severe Weather Week is April 19th through April 23rd, with the tornado drill on April 21st.

Motion made by Russell, seconded by Greenough, to approve the Emergency Management Performance Grant – Covid-19 Supplemental grant funding for \$570.57, and authorize the chairman to sign.

Maynard spoke of being awarded \$1,111.96 for the 2021 Local Emergency Planning Committee Grant (LEPC); a letter of support for the Wildfire and Forest Pest Mitigation project in the area surrounding Hot Springs; NWS weather spotter training; the Kawasaki ATV being repaired; and the SD OEM Shelter Trailer was inventoried on April 13^{th.} Maynard advised that water is being tested at the South Annex and reported on fires and incidents. Discussion was held on possible signs or ways to notify traffic during storms when the road is closed, or alternative routes are available, Maynard will pursue the sign issue.

Bob Evans, Sheriff, met with the board and reported that there are 4 females and 9 males in the Fall River County Jail, with 3 males in the Pennington County Jail, with 1 inmate on work release, for a total of 17 inmates.

Motion made by Allen, seconded by Greenough, to authorize an additional credit card and change the credit card policy to include the administrative assistant position for the sheriff department as a card holder, with a log to keep track of who has it and only for fuel use purposes.

Evans updated the board that there will be bills coming in from the Hot Springs Ambulance service for law enforcement training re-certification. Russell asked Evans to continue investigating barking dogs north of the Coffee Cup and work with the state's attorney.

Erin McGlumphy, Extension, met with the board for her quarterly report, advising that the 4-H program is growing, and participants are increasing. 19 youth are involved in shooting sports, horse safety and quality assurance training are coming up, 8 kids are involved in clover buds, Achievement Days will be held at the end of July, in conjunction with fair. The fair board has asked that livestock sale will be held a day later than normal, but the rest should be close to the same.

Dave Weishaupl, Building Supervisor, met with the board. Motion made by Russell, seconded by Allen, to approve the Kohler quote for a radiator on the jail generator, in the amount of \$3,020.00.

Motion made by Greenough, seconded by Russell, to approve the Golden West quote for the SonicWall Advanced Gateway Security Suite Bundle for TZ500 Series – 1 year, in the amount of \$917.90.

Sue Ganje, Auditor, met with the board to report on 2018 – 2019 Department of Legislative Audit discrepancies, reported on the monies collected on liens, and gave a review of the 2020 annual report.

Lance Russell, State's Attorney, met with the board to follow-up on the solar farm. There is no regulatory authority, and it is the general rule that counties and cities only have powers that are granted by statue. There is no enforcement of bond, (unlike wind power), legislation is needed for solar power. Concerns were raised about batteries, etc. that could be left behind after the farm left. The board would like the State's Attorney to draft a written letter for the next meeting with their concerns and request for legislation.

Motion made by Allen, seconded by Russell, to approve the agreement between Fall River County and Argentine Township for Project BRO 8024(00)19-1, and authorize the chairman to sign.

Lance Russell advised the board that Edie Jenniges will be retiring in May and asked for hire approval. Motion made by Greenough, seconded by Russell, to approve hiring Lynn Two Bear, as a legal assistant, \$16.00 per hour, effective April 21, 2021 as per union contract.

Randy Seiler, Highway Superintendent, met with the board. Motion made by Allen, seconded by Greenough, to approve hiring Tyson Tuma, equipment operator with CDL, \$17.05 per hour, effective May 3, 2021, as per union contract.

Motion made by Greenough, seconded by Russell, to approve the March 2021 reimbursement to the highway department for fuel used or work performed as follows: Sheriff's Department for \$2,449.21; Weed and Pest Department for \$118.04; Building for \$58.72; Emergency Management for \$67.43; and Director of Equalization for \$74.63.

Motion made by Greenough, seconded by Russell, to approve the application by Jennifer Thompson for a road approach permit on the north side of Pilger Mountain Rd., CR#12.

Public comment was heard from Commissioner Falkenburg on a federal law change on capital gains, with a possible resolution at the next meeting, and on the number of counties that have approved sanctuary designations, and that our governor needs to declare SD as a sanctuary state. Jim Angell spoke of bonding through DENR.

District 30 Senator Julie Frye-Mueller, and Representative Trish Ladner, met with the board to continue the discussion on the new soil map. Discussion was held on examples of places that were not tillable croplands, and that West River cannot be classified like East River. Greenough noted that even the National Grasslands had portions of land designated as crop. Frye-Mueller spoke of ranchers attempting to litigate to make a change, without being successful. Frye-Mueller and Ladner are willing to amend, re-write or draft a bill for the upcoming special session to help the issue. Hayes will visit with other equalization directors when the appeal process is completed to see how soil tables have affected other counties

Frye-Mueller spoke of her discussion with a federal representative on the closure of the Hill City sawmill, noting a push to decrease forest products. The effect to the community was unknown to the representative. Discussion was held on the loss of revenue, taxes and conservation issues, and Frye-Mueller noted the US Congressional Delegates have all the power on the issue.

Susie Hayes, Director of Equalization, met with the board to discuss HB 1085, and of the Agriculture forms that will be going out this summer to confirm agriculture status. Forms will be required to be filed with the Director of Equalization's office.

Motion made by Greenough, seconded by Allen, to approve 2 temporary full-time help for the Director of Equalization office to assist with ag applications and field work.

Motion made by Russell, seconded by Greenough, to adjourn at 10:57 a.m.

SDCL 34-25-38.1 Issuance of disinterment permit. A disinterment permit shall be issued by the department upon receipt of a written or electronic application from a person licensed by the State Board of Funeral Service or upon receipt of an order of a court of competent jurisdiction directing the disinterment. If the disinterment is not directed pursuant to a court order, the department may not issue a disinterment permit without the written consent of the surviving spouse, or in the case of a spouse's absence, death, or incapacity, the next of kin within the same degree of kinship. In the case of a minor, if the disinterment is not directed pursuant to a court order, the department may not issue a disinterment permit for the minor without the written consent of the surviving parents. The Department of Health may promulgate rules pursuant to chapter 1-26 to establish the process for issuing a disinterment permit that is not directed pursuant to a court order. The disinterment permit becomes effective as provided in this section. Unless the disinterment permit was issued as the result of a court order, the department shall, upon issuance of the disinterment permit, notify the affected cemetery board of directors appointed pursuant to § 7-26-7 or 9-12-18 or the board of county commissioners of the county in which the disinterment is to occur on the issuance of the permit. The cemetery board of directors or the board of county commissioners may request the circuit court to prevent the disinterment. The disinterment permit shall take effect within fifteen days after its issuance unless the circuit court has ordered otherwise. The disinterment permit authorizes disinterment, transportation, and reinterment of a dead body or fetus. Authorities in charge of a cemetery may not transfer bodies buried in one part of the cemetery to another part without the authority of a disinterment permit.

ARSD 44:09:03:04 Disinterment Permits. Upon issuance of a disinterment permit by the Department of Health, the department shall notify in writing the affected cemetery board of directors or the board of county commissioners. The notice must be postmarked no later than two business days after the receipt of the application for a disinterment permit.



Re: Financial Security for decommissioning of solar infrastructure

Dear Governor Noem:

A solar energy facility is proposed for construction in eastern Fall River County near the Town of Oelrichs. The proposed facility will inhabit the majority of two sections with considerable infrastructure designed to capture solar energy and transmit the energy via adjacent Black Hills Energy power lines.

The reason for this writing is our concern about the future decommissioning of the significant solar infrastructure. The future expense of decommissioning hundreds of acres of solar infrastructure will be expensive and cost prohibitive for Fall River County landowners if not completed by the solar company or secured by a bond or other financial security. Although South Dakota Codified Law 49-41B-39, enacted in 2019, provides for financial security for the decommissioning of wind turbines, there is no corresponding financial security provision for solar infrastructure. The Fall River County Commission believes this loophole should be closed.

Governor, the Fall River County Commission respectfully requests that you give serious consideration to fixing this loophole in South Dakota law by adding solar energy facilities to financial security requirements for decommissioning wind turbines in SDCL 49-41B-39. The simple addition of solar energy facilities to that statute's requirements would be an easy fix, as solar energy facilities are also mentioned and provided for in SDCL Chapter 49-41B. We believe this fix is not only simple but would assure that adjacent landowners and the local governmental agencies will not be responsible for any adverse consequences of failure of solar energy companies to fully decommission developed sites.



According to Powertech and Azarga, in situ uranium mining is environmentally friendly and has less impacts than other kinds of mining like open pit mining — there's minimal surface disturbance, reduced water usage, aquifers' water quality is restored, and there is no additional solid waste generated from the process.

Interveners in the project's permit applications, however, oppose the mining project on the basis that it will destroy the water supply for the southwestern portion of the state, where water scarcity is already an issue. Fall River County's biggest economic draw is agriculture, so having an ample water supply is important for community members who depend on farming or ranching.

the mineral and surface rights for 12,613 surface acres and 16,962 net mineral acres, and now they are seeking a water rights permit from the state Water Management Board — the next step in the permitting process. The WMB can grant water rights for available water in an area. The water itself belongs to the state, but other parties can be granted rights if they meet the criteria.

The three permits Powertech has left to obtain before they can begin operations are all from the state Department of Agriculture and Natural Resources: the Ground Water Discharge Plan, the Water Rights Permit, and the Large Scale Mine Plan Permit.

The first license Powertech received, the source and by-product materials license, was issued by the Nuclear Regulatory Commission in April 2014, despite a lawsuit brought by the Oglala Sioux Tribe re-

Susan Henderson, a rancher from Edgemont and an intervener in the Powertech case, said the project won't have any benefit to anyone in South Dakota and will "probably destroy" Fall River County. Henderson said no mining company has ever sufficiently restored an aquifer's water quality after contaminating it and she does not have faith that Powertech would be the first.

"Once they extract the uranium they turn around and dump the slag containing lixiviates back into the water. The next thing you know, they've contaminated the aquifers. We'll never get back out of this," Henderson told the Journal. "The acids stay there and keep dissolving stuff. [These chemicals] move once you inject [them] into the ground. It doesn't stop."

Henderson said by the time Powertech obtains all its permits and begins its work, the contamination will begin soon after and create irreversible damage.

"You can't put [water quality] back together; this is not Humpty Dumpty," she said. "This isn't ever going to be workable, and it's going to happen quickly – the minute they start drilling it will affect the water and we

The U.S. Atomic Safety and Licensing Board granted them the license despite the company's failure to complete a cultural resources survey of the mining area. The three judges on the board sided with Powertech, but the Oglala Sioux Tribe has appealed the decision.

Powertech was also issued two permits by the Environmental Protection Agency in November 2020, which were then appealed to the Environmental Appeals Board. However, the company does not expect either appeal to be successful, so they are moving ahead with the other permits.

When the company first submitted the applications to the then-Department of Environment and Natural Resources in 2013, the two federal permits had not yet been issued. Now that the federal regulatory approvals have been completed, the company's focus is on resuming hearings related to the three state permits.

The Journal reached out to Powertech/Azarga for comment but did not receive a response.

The WMB hearing for Powertech will take place during the Board's regular







SB 152 – County's Issuance of off-sale liquor licenses.

Fall River County will have 4 off-sale licenses to issue, to be effective 7-1-21.

After consulting with State's Attorney Russell, the Board will need to do the following items to be effective 7-1-21:

1) Set a fee between \$300.00 to \$500.00 for these licenses.

2)Determine if the applicant meets the requirement of SDCL 35-2-6.2 (Character requirements for licensees. Any licensee under this title shall be a person of good moral character, never convicted of a felony, and, if a corporation, the managing officers of the corporation shall meet the same qualifications).

3) Determine how licenses will be allocated to applicants

Currently, Fall River County issues 4 Liquor Licenses, and 1 Restaurant – Liquor license holders are as follows:

- 1)Angostura Den (Angostura Den Inc.) 28041 Hwy 385 S
- 2)Coffee Cup Travel Plaza (H & H Enterprises) 27638 US HWY 385
- 3)Pirates Pub (TTT Taverns, LLC) 27679 Hwy 385
- 4)Stateline Casino (All 5 Gears LLC), 30387 Hwy 385, Oelrichs
- 1)Inferno On The Beach, Angostura Resort Management, Inc 30387 Hwy 385

Fall River County also issues Malt Beverage and SD Wine licenses to the 5 liquor licenses holders noted above, plus to Common Cents Food, Forney's Standard, Hidden Lake Campground and Resort, and the Hot Springs KOA.

All current Liquor License/Malt Beverage & SD wine License holders, plus the 4 other Malt Beverage & SD Wine licenses holders are eligible to apply for the Liquor off-sale License, plus any other interested parties.



- 4 35-4-6. Off-sale licenses--County, municipality, or improvement district.

Except as provided in subdivisions 35 4-2(12) and (16), off-sale licenses may enly be issued under this chapter to operate within a <u>county</u>, municipality or an improvement district created pursuant to chapter 7-25A.

- Section 2. That § 35-4-11.1 be AMENDED.
 - 35-4-11.1. Counties--Number of licenses and amount of fees--Number restricted by population--Denial of reissuance.

If not previously fixed by ordinance or continuing resolution, the board of county commissioners shall, before the second of September in each year, determine the number of on-sale and off-sale licenses it will approve for the ensuing calendar year and the fees to be charged for the various classifications of licenses. The number of licenses issued pursuant to subdivision 35-4-2(6) may not exceed three for the first one thousand of population and may not exceed one for each additional fifteen hundred of population or fraction thereof. The number of licenses issued pursuant to subdivisions 35-4-2(3) and 35-4-2(12) may not exceed two for the first one thousand of population and may not exceed one for each additional fifteen hundred of population or fraction thereof. The population includes only those residing within the county, but outside the incorporated municipalities and improvement districts, created pursuant to chapter 7-25A, within the county. No licensee regularly licensed to do business on July 1, 1981, may be denied reissuance of a license in subsequent years solely by reason of any limitations, based upon population quotas, of the number of licenses authorized or established under the provisions of this title. Licenses issued to concessionaires, and lessees of the State of

- South Dakota, within the boundaries of state parks, prior to January 1, 1983, may be
- 2 subtracted when calculating the total number of licenses permitted in this section.

Black Hills Regional Multiple Use Coalition-March 26, 2021

The March 2021 BHRMUC meeting was called to order at 4:00 pm at the Holiday Inn in Spearfish, SD. Those in attendance were Jean Kennedy, Dave Kennedy, Eric Jennings, Frank Bloom, Druse Kellogg, Rich Eddy, Bill Coburn, Kevin Forrester, Kwinn Neff, Sandor Ringhoffer, Larry Mann, Kristopher Jensen, Ron Rossknecht, Patty Brown, Butch Oien, Aaron Thompson, Hugh Thompson, Randy Diebert, Don Hausle, Ben Wudtke, Nathan Alexander, and Matt Lottes.

The new Black Hills Forest Supervisor Jeff Tomac was in attendance to talk with the group about the following:

The Black Hills Forest Plan revision process is planned to begin around the end of July 2021. Jeff says he does not intend to "drag out" the revision process and thinks that a revision can be completed within 3 years.

OHV Summit — One of Jeff's key concerns is determining vehicle width restrictions on trails. Don Hausle commented on how revenue from OHV trail stickers does not go towards road system maintenance despite OHV's causing significant damage to the road system. An OHV Working Group will be formed to expedite decision making. Bill Coburn commented on the need for more diversity in stakeholder representation in the proposed working group committee. Jeff said he'd take a look at that. Randy Diebert has a list of 12 stakeholders (instead of the proposed 20) to making up the working group. Jeff stated that the OHV Working Group should NOT be a Forest Service-led group.

Randy asked Jeff how much the NFAB recommendation to the Forest Service will affect the decision on the timber sale program. Jeff said he'd "heavily" rely on the NFAB recommendation.

Ben commented on how past Forest Supervisors have "kicked the can down the road" in regards to addressing trail issues. Jeff apologized for the lack of action of previous Supervisors and does not intend to follow suit.

Larry Mann of F3 Gold addressed how the mining permitting process in the absence of a categorical exclusion has been ongoing for three years now and has cost F3 Gold hundreds of thousands of dollars in the meantime.

Ben spoke on how the OHV Summit didn't result in many answers to trail issues besides the decision to form an OHV Working Group. Ben also mentioned the BHRMUC should consider using funds to help pay for a leader/director of the Working Group if it's truly not Forest Service-led.

Hugh made a motion for the group to donate \$500 dollars to the Halverson family who lost their home in a recent fire. James Halverson has been a member of the BHRMUC and his wife Jessica is the coordinator for Wyoming Project Learning Tree. Eric was concerned that such a donation from the coalition would set the wrong precedent. The motion went to a vote and the room was split 6-6, so Hugh withdrew his motion.

Ben spoke on the recent announcement by Neiman Timber Company that its Hill City Sawmill, Rushmore Forest Products, is scheduled to close at the end of May 2021. Ben passed out copies of the press release.

Randy commented that the "forest belongs to us," and that has been obstructed by the lack representation in the decision-making process regarding timber sales.

Eric passed out copies of the treasurer's report. Balance of \$15,438.36 as of 3/26/2021. Report was approved.

Meeting adjourned at 6:16 PM

Taxes, Taxes, Taxes

An informational meeting will be held on taxation and valuation on May 26, 2021, 3:00 – 5:30 pm at the Mueller Center. County Commissioners, District 30 Senator and Representatives will be available to answer questions and provide information.

Bob,

I have taken the opportunity to provide the following:

- 1. Sample County Temporary Ordinance Regarding the Issuance of Local Medical Cannabis Establishment Permits and/or Licenses
- 2. County Adoption Process for counties with or without zoning regulations
- 3. Public Hearing Notices for counties with or without a planning commission
- 4. Notice of Adoption
- 5. Sample Agendas for counties with or without a planning commission
- 6. Sample Decision Process for counties with or without a planning commission

I plan on sending this information to the following:

South Dakota Planners Association, Planning Districts, and the counties within the First District.

I would suggest that SDACC send this information to all of its members with the caveat that they should have their attorney review the temporary ordinance prior to adoption. Further, if the county is interested there is a timeline that needs to be adhered to:

- 1. Public hearing notice to be published 10 days prior to public hearing
- 2. Hold Public Hearing and 1st reading of the ordinance
- 3. Wait at least 5 days and then hold 2nd reading and adopt
- 4. Publish notice of adoption
- 5. Ordinance in effect on date of publication

The timeline assumes a weekly newspaper publication, so from the cutoff date of sending the public hearing notice to the newspaper to the notice of adoption being published in the newspaper, a conservative estimate is that it could take up to 28 days, depending on publication cutoffs, to complete the process.

A lot of good work has gone into this. However, the heavy lift is still ahead of us. I anticipate some form of a model zoning, zoning/licensing, or licensing ordinances will be developed in May. I hope to follow the same format that SDML, SDPAA, Jack Hieb, Zach Peterson, Sam Trebilcock, and myself utilized in developing this temporary ordinance. I hope to have the ordinances vetted in June with a possible dissemination to cities and counties in July. Cities and counties will not have a lot of time to review the models and pick what they like or don't like because the adoption process for these ordinances can take up to 45 to 60 days, depending on the newspaper.

A TEMPORARY ORDINANCE REGARDING THE ISSUANCE OF LOCAL MEDICAL CANNABIS ESTABLISHMENT PERMITS AND/OR LICENSES.

WHEREAS, a local government may enact an ordinance not in conflict with SDCL Chapter 34-20G, governing the time, place, manner, and number of medical cannabis establishments in the locality. A local government may establish civil penalties for violation of an ordinance governing the time, place, and manner of a medical cannabis establishment that may operate in the locality. A local government may require a medical cannabis establishment to obtain a local license, zoning permit, or registration to operate, and may charge a reasonable fee for the local license, zoning permit, or registration.

WHEREAS, _____ County, SD ("County"), makes a preliminary finding that the County's current regulations and controls may not adequately address the unique needs and impacts of medical cannabis establishments as defined in SDCL 34-20G-1;

WHEREAS, medical cannabis state laws under SDCL 34-20G are effective July 1, 2021. The South Dakota Department of Health shall promulgate rules pursuant to chapter 1-26 not later than October 29, 2021, as defined by SDCL 34-20G-72. During the time between July 1, 2021 and potentially as late as October 29, 2021, local units of government will not yet know standards for medical cannabis and will not be able to adequately assess the local zoning and licensing requirements necessary to approve local permits and to better ensure applicants have a more predictable permitting process and avoid stranded investments.

WHEREAS, the County makes a preliminary finding that the County needs further study of the relationship of medical cannabis establishments to the County Comprehensive Plan and Zoning Ordinance. The public interest requires that the County study, analyze, and evaluate the impacts of medical cannabis establishments and to fully explore the impacts of any proposed regulations regarding medical cannabis establishments;

WHEREAS, the County makes a preliminary finding that it would be inappropriate for the County to issue a local permit or license to a medical cannabis establishment prior to the South Dakota Department of Health's promulgation of regulations governing the same;

WHEREAS, the County hereby exercises its authority under SDCL 11-2-10 and SDCL 7-18A-8, to establish a temporary ordinance regarding he issuance of any local permits/licenses for medical cannabis establishments within the County;

WHEREAS, a temporary ordinance will ensure that more comprehensive zoning ordinance and building permit changes, licensing permits, and any proposed amendments to the County's Comprehensive Plan can be completely examined with adequate public input from citizens, business interests, and medical cannabis industry representatives;

WHEREAS, the County finds that a temporary ordinance is reasonable to preserve the status quo and prevent significant investment pending the outcome of the above study and any proposed regulations emanating therefrom;

WHEREAS, the County finds that the following ordinance is necessary to protect and immediately preserve the public health, safety, welfare, peace and support of the county government and its existing public institutions;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY County, SD:

Section 1. Temporary Ordinance – Application for Local Permit/License

A medical cannabis establishment desiring to operate in the County shall be required to apply for a permit and/or license from the County. Applications for a local permit and/or license to operate a medical cannabis establishment, as defined by SDCL 34-20G-1, shall not be accepted until the South Dakota Department of Health has promulgated regulations as required by SDCL 30-20G-72. Any application received prior to such regulations being promulgated shall be denied.

Section 2. Immediate Effect.

This ordinance is necessary to protect and immediately preserve the public health, safety, welfare, peace, and support of the county government and its existing public institutions pursuant to SDCL 11-2-10 and SDCL 7-18A-8.
