FALL RIVER COUNTY UNAPPROVED MINUTES OF MARCH 16, 2023

The Fall River Board of County Commissioners met in regular session on March 16, 2023. Present: Joe Allen, Les Cope, Joe Falkenburg, Heath Greenough, Deb Russell and Sue Ganje, Auditor.

The Pledge of Allegiance was given, and the meeting called to order at 9:00 a.m.

The agenda was reviewed for conflicts; none were noted. ALL MOTIONS RECORDED IN THESE MINUTES WERE PASSED BY UNANIMOUS VOTE, UNLESS OTHERWISE STATED. Motion made by Greenough, seconded by Allen, to approve the agenda as written.

Motion made by Russell, seconded by Allen, to approve the minutes of March 2, 2023.

The February 2023 Auditor's Account with the Treasurer was not available.

Motion made by Russell, seconded by Greenough, to approve pay raises for Veronica Quintana (Dispatcher), \$21.25 to \$22.50 per hour, effective March 1, 2023, plus longevity pay, \$25.00 per month; Brian Martin (Highway Department) \$21.00 to \$21.75 per hour, effective March 14, 2023, as per union contract.

Motion made by Greenough, seconded by Allen, to surplus to junk #02461, Sceptre 24" Curved 75HZ LED Monitor Full HD, Treasurer's Office.

Motion made by Cope, seconded by Greenough, to approve the following proclamation:

Fall River County Proclamation A proclamation designating March 30, 2023 as "Welcome Home Veteran's Day"

Whereas, the Vietnam War was fought in Vietnam from 1961 to 1975, and involved North Vietnam and the Viet Cong in conflict with the United States Armed Forces and South Vietnam; and

Whereas, the United States became involved in Vietnam because policymakers in the United States believed that if South Vietnam fell to a Communist government then Communism would spread throughout the rest of Southeast Asia; and

Whereas, members of the United States Armed Forces began serving in an advisory role in the South Vietnamese in 1961; and

Whereas, as a result of the Gulf of Tonkin incidents on August 2, 1964, and August 4, 1964, Congress overwhelmingly passed the Gulf of Tonkin Resolution, on August 7, 1964, which effectively handed over war-making powers to President Johnson until such time as "peace and security" had returned to Vietnam; and

Whereas, in 1965, United States Armed Forces ground combat units arrived in Vietnam; and

Whereas, by the end of 1965, there were 80,000 United States troops in Vietnam, and by 1969 a peak of approximately 543,000 troops was reached; and

Whereas, on January 27, 1973, the Treaty of Paris was signed, which required the release of all United States prisoners-of-war held in North Vietnam and the withdrawal of all United States Armed Forces from South Vietnam; and

Whereas, on March 29, 1973, the United States Armed Forces completed the withdrawal of combat troops from Vietnam; and

Whereas, more than 58,000 members of the United States Armed Forces lost their lives in Vietnam and more than 300,000 members of the Armed Forces were wounded; and

Whereas, members of the United States Armed Forces, who served bravely and faithfully for the United States during the Vietnam War, were caught upon their return home in the crossfire of public debate about the involvement of the United States in the Vietnam War; and

Whereas, it was also the first time in history America failed to welcome its veterans back as heroes; and

Whereas, the establishment of a "Welcome Home Vietnam Veterans Day" would be an appropriate way to honor those members of the United States Armed Forces who served in Vietnam during the Vietnam War; and

Whereas, Hot Springs, SD, in Fall River County is known as the Veterans Town; and

Now, therefore be it resolved that the Fall River County Commissioners do hereby recognize March 30, 2023 as "Welcome Home Vietnam Veterans Day". The Fall River County Commissioners further honors and recognizes the contributions of veterans of the Armed Forces who served in Vietnam.

Lyle Norton, Sheriff, reported to the Board that there are 10 males and 3 females in the Fall River County Jail, with 1 male and 1 female in the Pennington County Jail.

Discussion was held on the male inmate in the Pennington County Jail. A request was also reviewed for a possible transfer of two sheriff vehicles to the Oelrichs Fire Department for practice on Jaws of Life equipment, etc. This item will be on the next meeting agenda.

Frank Maynard, Emergency Management, reported to the Board that the Homeland Security meeting will be held March 21, 2023, in Rapid City. The local priority meeting will be held prior to that date. Hot Springs will hold a tornado drill on March 20, 2023, between 9:30 a.m. and 10 a.m. An alert will be sent out using the Code Red system. This will be a test to make sure the siren works; other communities' sirens will be tested at a later date. The date for the Hazardous Materials Awareness Training is May 10, 2023, at 6 p.m. at the South Annex. Discussion was held on the Hot Springs Fire Department purchasing an air compressor to fill SCBA bottles. The compressor would be available for other entities in the county

to use, but they are looking for donations to purchase the air compressor. Maynard also reported on fires and incidents.

Five new proposed national opioid settlements ("New National Opioid Settlements") have been reached with **Teva**, **Allergan**, **CVS**, **Walgreens**, **and Walmart** ("Settling Defendants"). This *Participation Package* is a follow-up communication to the *Notice of National Opioid Settlements* recently received electronically by your subdivision or special district ("subdivision").

You are receiving this *Participation Package* because South Dakota is participating in the following settlements:

- Teva
- Allergan
- CVS
- Walgreens
- Walmart

If a state does not participate in a particular Settlement, the subdivisions in that state are not eligible to participate in that Settlement.

This electronic envelope contains:

Participation Forms for Teva, Allergan, CVS, Walgreens, and Walmart, including a release of any claims.

The Participation Form for each settlement must be executed, without alteration, and submitted on or before April 18, 2023, in order for your subdivision to be considered for initial participation calculations and payment eligibility.

Based upon subdivision participation forms received on or before April 18th, the subdivision participation rate will be used to determine whether participation for each deal is sufficient for the settlement to move forward and whether a state earns its maximum potential payment under the settlement. If the settlement moves forward, your release will become effective. If a settlement does not move forward, that release will not become effective.

Any subdivision that does <u>not</u> participate cannot directly share in the settlement funds, even if the subdivision's state is settling and other participating subdivisions are sharing in settlement funds. Any subdivision that does <u>not</u> participate may also reduce the amount of money for programs to remediate the opioid crisis in its state. Please note, a subdivision will not necessarily directly receive settlement funds by participating; decisions on how settlement funds will be allocated within a state are subject to intrastate agreements or state statutes.

You are encouraged to discuss the terms and benefits of the *New National Opioid Settlements* with your counsel, your Attorney General's Office, and other contacts within your state. Many states are implementing and allocating funds for these new settlements the same as they did for the prior opioid settlements with McKesson, Cardinal, Amerisource, and J&J/Janssen, but states may choose to treat these settlements differently.



Melissa received her undergrad at Northern Arizona University in Flagstaff, AZ, and started her career path in Victim Assistance. In 2017, Melissa was a victim of Domestic Violence, where she almost lost her life. Melissa discovered that roller derby was not only a savior for her during this time, but it was the empowering athletes within this sport who brought her back to life. Melissa earned the nickname Skeet Fighter through roller derby and is the name she is known for within her roller skating mission. Her love for the outdoors combined with roller skating turned into her passion for trail skating. In 2021, Melissa roller skated 192 miles across the Navajo Nation to bring awareness to Missing & Murdered Indigenous Persons which led to a documentary to share her experience. Melissa is a Native Hope fellow and through her fellowship, she will continue her trail skating awareness, with big plans to bring further awareness and education about Missing and Murdered Indigenous Persons, health, wellness and healing.

BRETT GARLAND LESS BUMPS IN THE ROAD: MULTI-DISCIPLINARY APPROACH South Dakota School Safety Program

Brett Garland will facilitate this breakout session focusing on trauma-informed investigations and the importance of collaborative partnerships. Having a trauma-informed investigative protocol and being knowledgeable about victim services and all other organizations, agencies, and coalitions working together, on a multi-disciplinary, cross-cultural scale makes less bumps in the road to justice for victims and survivors.

The presentation includes photographs, videos, trial testimony, and trial exhibits, as well as benefits of law enforcement and victim services collaboration.

LARA ROETZEL AND HEATHER SAZAMA JURISDICTION IN SOUTH DAKOTA

This training will address the jurisdictional challenges in South Dakota from both a state and federal perspective. Lara Roetzel is a former Deputy States Attorney and has experience in prosecuting cases with jurisdictional complications. AUSA Sazama can speak to federal jurisdictional matters in South Dakota as well as sexual assault and human trafficking cases being presented to the U.S. Attorney's Office for federal prosecution.

HOLLIE STRAND (closing keynote) CURRENT TRENDS IN INTERNET CRIMES AGAINST CHILDREN CASES

This training emphasizes the trends currently being seen by the Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force, how cases are referred, how victims are identified, how they work these challenging cases and in-person victimizations that are currently trending in western South Dakota. This presenter sprinkles her magic throughout the session, even while sharing information on a very difficult topic.

Breakout LISTENING SESSIONS DAY 2:

CARY THRALL WELLNESS

An individual's own overall resilience, notably after dealing with vicarious trauma of crime victim and survivor responses and organizational stress impact our ability to effectively assist, collaborate and build necessary coalitions. Cary suggests multiple strategies leading toward personal resilience and wellness.

CURT L. MULLER PREDATOR ON THE RESERVATION

Have you ever wanted to have the chance to ask about all these acronyms; US DHHS/OIG/OI? Curt L. Muller is offering the opportunity to ask just what are responsibilities for the Special Agent in Charge and Acting Senior Advisor for Investigative Operations, under the Office of Inspector General for the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services? SA Muller and former Bureau of Indian Affairs Special Agent Fred Bennett will also allow ample time for questions about the Case Study of a multi-state historical child sexual assault investigation, in which the perpetrator was an Indian Health Service pediatrician. The breakout listening session will emphasize benefits of law enforcement and victim services collaboration.

HOLLIE STRAND (breakout) HOW CAN YOU DO THIS WORK?

Resiliency For Advocates and Those We Serve

This training emphasizes the role of living by decision rather than default in one's resilience, a necessary resource for advocates and those we serve. Hollie Strand will share from her personal experience, and emphasize the role technology can play while honing everyone's resilience. Ample opportunities to bring in the insightful voices and impressions of peers will be provided.

JUDY MILDREN Burning Bridges to Building Bridges of Hope and Healing

We all know that providing services to traumatized victims and survivors can result in a variety of challenging situations. What do you do as a victim service provider when the crime victim you are assisting has "burned their bridges" with other shelters or service providers? This smaller listening session will provide the chance to ask those difficult questions and brainstorm solutions without sharing any identifying information during this opportunity to connect on a deeper level.

MARLYS BIG EAGLE PROVIDING VICTIM SERVICES AND RESOURCES IN THE NATIVE CULTURE

We all know that providing services and resources to victims and survivors in their native culture is extremely valuable. Marlys Big Eagle will share why certain teachings are of important cultural value in Native American heritage. This listening session provides a forum for participants to engage in critical conversations around culture and victim services, Missing and Murdered Indigenous Relatives, and Human Trafficking. Together, we advance MMIW, HT, and all victim services with better understanding of Native driven victim-centered content, grounded in protecting our Tribal communities and all our communities, now and for future generations.

The Nebraska National Forests and Grasslands, Fall River Ranger District requests your input on the Range Fiber Optic Line Project. This letter and the attached figure will provide you with information on the background of the project, the purpose and need, the proposed action, the nature of the decision to be made, as well as a request for your comments.

Introduction

Decisions on how to manage your National Forests and Grasslands follow a public process referred to as the NEPA process. NEPA is the National Environmental Policy Act, which requires federal agencies to disclose the effects of our proposed actions and to include public participation in our decisions. The Nebraska National Forests and Grasslands Plan provides the overall direction on how we manage the Forests and Grasslands. Additional laws, rules, regulations help guide and govern this decision process. The Fall River Ranger District will be analyzing the effects of this proposed action, and pending no extraordinary circumstances are identified, documenting the analysis as a Categorical Exclusion (CE).

Please take the time to review the Range Fiber Optic Line Project public scoping document. Your comments and feedback can help to refine the proposed action and strengthen our analysis. By providing comments, you are able to express your opinions about site-specific areas on the Forests and Grasslands that are being considered for future projects, identify issues and concerns related to the proposed actions, and to provide additional information on management opportunities.

Project Area

Installation of an underground fiber optic line will extend from the South Dakota/Wyoming state line along US Highway 18 to the city of Edgemont, SD.

Purpose and Need

The purpose of the project is to meet the goals of the United States Department of Agriculture's emphasis on rural development and the ReConnect Program.

This project is needed to provide updated broadband services to rural communities such as the City of Edgemont, SD.

Proposed Action

The Range Fiber Optic Line Project proposes to construct approximately 12 miles of new underground fiber optic line within the existing US Highway 18 and adjacent Fall River County





road rights-of-way. Short portions of the underground installation would intersect US Forest Service managed properties.

Implementation

After receiving comments, we will identify and analyze any issues raised and work to finalize the Proposed Action. Our plan is to complete the NEPA analysis and issue a decision by May 2023. Implementation of the project may begin at any time following a final decision.

Dear Reader:

The Bureau of Land Management (BLM) received Expressions of Interest to sell Federal oil and gas leases on 51 parcels of Federal minerals in a future lease sale. The purpose and need for action is to 1) respond to EOIs to lease parcels of land for oil and gas development as mandated by Federal laws, and 2) prevent substantial loss of oil and gas resources from Federal lands due to drainage and ensure that Federal lessors are not subjected to revenue losses through drainage. Offering parcels for competitive oil and gas leasing provides opportunities for private individuals or companies to explore and develop federal oil and gas resources after receipt of necessary approvals, and to sell the oil and gas in public markets.

The proposed action is to lease 51 parcels within the North Dakota Field Office, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, and Dakota Prairie Grasslands (USFS) areas. The BLM applied surface use stipulations to the parcels to avoid and minimize impacts to resources consistent with management decisions in the applicable Resource Management Plan (RMP). Those stipulations include but are not limited to no surface occupancy in streams, riparian areas, and floodplains, controlled surface use for air, sensitive soils and paleontological resources, timing limitations to minimize impacts to special status species, raptors and waterfowl during critical time periods, and survey and consultation requirements for cultural resources and threatened/endangered species. The BLM prepared an Environmental Assessment to disclose the reasonable foreseeable effects of the June 27, 2023 lease sale on five resource issues: Air Resources, Greenhouse Gases, Greater Sage-Grouse, Socio-economic Conditions, Environmental Justice, Human Health, and Water Resources. The EA also discloses how stipulations avoid/minimize impacts to other resources such as, but not limited to, cultural and paleontological resources, recreation, and special status species. Additionally, in accordance with the August 5, 2020, Montana / Dakotas Instruction Memorandum No. MT-2020-018, the BLM completed a sage-grouse prioritization assessment consistent with 2015 Sage-Grouse Resource Management Plans and Montana District Court Order in Case 4:18-cv-00069-BMM (5/22/2020). Refer to the Lease Sale Prioritization Assessment and IM-MT-2020-018 available on the June 27, 2023 Lease Sale project page on e-Planning for more information.

Dear Sir or Ma'am,

The State of South Dakota has entered the 22nd year of our free voluntary abandoned tank removal program and has removed abandoned underground petroleum tanks at approximately 3,700 sites. Under the program, South Dakota Department of Environment and Natural Resources will remove tanks that qualify and perform environmental cleanup actions we deem necessary to protect human health at no cost to the owner.

The state wants to remove every abandoned underground storage tank that was used to store a petroleum product. Examples of petroleum products are gasoline, diesel, fuel oil, aviation fuel, waste oil, etc. In many of these situations, petroleum products may still be in the tanks or may have leaked into the ground. This spillage can cause our ground water to become polluted and may be a risk to people in the area. The state will not remove petroleum tanks that may be inaccessible, such as beneath a building. The free tank removals do not apply to tanks that were in retail service on or after April 1, 1988. Non-petroleum tanks such as propane tanks, cisterns, and septic tanks are not eligible under this program.

We wanted your county to know about this ongoing program. Enclosed with the tank removal application form is a summary fact sheet. The sheet lists the steps tank owners need to take to get tanks removed. Any help you can give us in getting the word out about it would be appreciated. Please forward information to anyone within your office and county who would benefit from the program and give copies of the forms to anyone you know who may have abandoned tanks on their property.

Abandoned Tank Removal Program

Why should I consider getting my tank removed?



Tanks should be removed for two reasons. First, as tanks corrode, any petroleum that may still be in them will leak into our state's ground water. One gallon of gasoline has the potential to render one million gallons of water undrinkable. Leaks from tanks can also contaminate soil around the tanks and cause unhealthy gasoline vapors to seep into basements of private homes and businesses. Since these tanks are buried under several feet of soil, these problems can go unnoticed for years.

Second, the longer these old tanks remain in the ground, the more corroded they become. As the tanks become more corroded, there is an increased risk of the tank collapsing, and someone, or something, falling into the hole or tank.

What tanks will the state remove?

The state wants to remove every out-of-service underground storage tank that was used to store a petroleum product. Examples of petroleum products are gasoline, diesel, fuel oil, aviation fuel, waste oil, etc. The state will not remove petroleum tanks that may be inaccessible, such as beneath a building. The free tank removals do not apply to tanks that were in service for the sale of petroleum fuels on or after April 1, 1988. Also, non-petroleum tanks such as propane tanks, cisterns, and septic tanks are not eligible under this program.

How are the tanks removed?

All you need to do is give the state permission to dig up your tanks and do any necessary cleanup. After you give your permission, the Department of Agriculture and Natural Resources (DANR) will hire private contractors to remove any remaining product from the tank, remove the tank, and test the soil. The contractor will also remove piping and contaminated backfill around the tank. The contractor then fills the hole. The state pays for all the costs associated with removing the tanks from your property and any additional cleanup that is needed. However, the state does not pay to have the site resurfaced with new pavement, concrete, gravel, or grass.

What does the program cost me?

The best news associated with this program is that with the exception of resurfacing costs, it is free to the landowner! This is an opportunity that you cannot pass up if you own property with eligible underground storage tanks that are no longer in service.

The program is funded by DANR's Petroleum Release Compensation Fund (PRCF). This is a fund created in part to address environmental problems associated with spills from tanks. The money comes from a tank inspection fee imposed on wholesale distributors of petroleum fuels.

Is there a lien placed on my property by the state?

The answer is NO! When the program was first approved by the 2000 Legislature, the state was required to place a lien on the property for five years. However, a bill was introduced during the 2001 legislative session to eliminate the lien. The bill was approved by the legislature and, because of an emergency clause on the bill, went into effect immediately after it was signed.

How do I give my permission to have my tanks removed?
